GEORGE T. MILLMORE DROWNED.

The Skiff Capsized in Mid-River—Close Call for Sheehan and Patterson.

Thursday morning at seven o'clock, Wm. Sheehan, Geo. T. Millmore and Fred Patterson after working all night in the Willamette paper mill took a skiff and started across the river for the Second street dock. The seats were frosty and when the boat was more than half way across Millmore slipped on the seat to one side of the boat, which tipped so that the others slipped to the same side when the boat capsized and they were all struggling in the cold and rapid water. Only Sheehan could swim, but Millmore had an oar with which he appeared to be helping himself. Sheehan assisted Patterson to the boat and started to help Millmore when the current swept him away and as Sheehan thought toward the shore, a short distance below the dock, and that is the last seen of him, for the current carried the boat, which was now underneath Sheehan and Patterson rapidly down stream, but it would not support the weight of both and whenever it sank Sheehan would relieve his end of his weight by swimming so that Patterson could cling to the boat. By this time their calls for assistance had been heard on shore and a man whose name could not be learned but who works for the electric company came to their aid from the west side in a boat and rescued them below the iron works on Fourth street. When taken from the water both were well nigh done for and another minute in the ice cold water would have made it fatal to the three. They were taken to the Livermore where both arrived almost exhausted, but are doing well.

George Millmore, aged 27, was a young man of good habits though known to but few here. He came from Maine where his folks live, last June and has since worked for the paper company. His folks have been notified of his death, and Mr. Gurnett, manager for the paper company, immediately set about recovering the body but so far without success. As the water is very deep where the accident occurred the work of dragging is very difficult and success doubtful.

An Interesting Meeting at Park Place—Lecture and Discussions.

The Clackamas County Teachers' association held an interesting and profitable meeting at the Park Place school house beginning Friday evening and continuing over Saturday. On Friday evening the program was by local talent with the exception of a talk by H. S. Strange, subject, "The Public Schools," which was interesting and instructive. Mrs. J. W. Gray added a great deal in the evenings enjoyment by her sweet singing.

Saturday after the preliminary opening exercises, the association added to its numbers by election of the following persons: Misses Amy Taylor, Edna Ross, Florence Olsen, Effie Young, Hettie Wintermantle and Belle Hibbard.

Prof. Alex. Thomson took up the subject, "Difficulties in Grammar" and gave an interesting talk on the subject which opened the way for a lively discussion participated in by Messrs. C. Y. Draper, Chas. Pease, Mr. Stupp and Miss Fannie Porter.

The discussion was followed by a pleasing recitation by Miss Doering. Miss Annie Reed teacher of the third grade at Park Place then presented one of her classes and illustrated her method of teaching language work. The members of the class acquitted themselves creditably and the exercise was interesting to all.

"Extras in School" was the subject assigned to Miss Fannie Porter, who treated the subject in an able manner, drawing upon her own experience for illustrations.

Alex. Thomson and Misses Williams and Doering were appointed by the president to prepare a program and Harmony was chosen as the next place of meeting.

After an elaborate lunch prepared and served by the ladies of Park Place and to which the teachers present gave their undivided attention for a time the exercises of the afternoon were introduced by a song rendered by several of the Park Place pupils.

Professor Alex. Thomson then gave one of his interesting recitations which was greatly enjoyed by all.

"Literature in Schools" was the topic discussed by Professor R. W. Pringle in a pleasing and profitable manner. The professor showed how this subject should be taught in conjunction with other kindred subjects and made of much advantage to the pupils.

C. Y. Draper presented the subject of "Bank Discount" ably and in a comprehensive manner, which was followed by a general discussion by the society.

Physical Culture" was treated by Professor J. W. Gray in a lucid and interesting style, after which James A. Chase addressed some remarks to the association which were practical and pointed.
