took the train for Roseburg, from where he rode out to Looking Glass, where he caught his man. J. C. Westerwalt, who had part of the tools in his possession. He was taken in tow and brought before Judge Fouts, where the evidence was such as to cause him to be held in the sum of \$300 to appear before the grand jury. In default of bail he was committed to jail. His partner, Green, who probably stole the tools for Westerwalt to sell will likely have the chance to return to Oregon City when Salem is done with him.

THE CONTRACT LET.—Waterworks contracts aggregating \$1,069,933.60 were let by the Portland water commission last week. The work was let for the headworks which went to J. M. Leavens of Portland for \$7,930; the bridges, five in number, let to the Pacific Bridge company of Portland for \$30,000; the steel plates for the conduit from the headworks to Mount Tabor, awarded to the Risdon Iron Works of San Francisco for \$340,971.60; manufacturing and laying the pipe awarded to Hoffman & Bates of Portland, for \$465,722; furnishing the cast iron pipe and equipments for the main from Mt. Tabor to the city park, let to the Oregon Iron & Steel company of Portland for \$255,310. All the work was let except the contract for the submerged pipe, for which the San Francisco Bridge company were the lowest bidders at \$97,240, which would bring the cost of the entire system up to \$1,167,273.60. New proposals for the submerged pipes, to cross the Willamette river, 2,100 lineal feet, which it was decided shall be of steel, and will be 33 inches in diameter, will soon be called for.

GOOD TIMES ASSURED.—The water committee according to the Oregonian, has resolved to spend over a million dollars on a pipe line, and a larger sum on the reservoir; the Portland General Electric company is to expend considerably over a million dollars at Oregon City and on lines to connect their new power station with this city; the Terminal company is to spend well along toward half a million in improving their terminal facilities, and about as much in completing the filling of Couch lake; the city hall commission is to proceed with the erection of a building to cost about half a million; the bridge commission is spending somewhere near a quarter of a million on the Burradstreet bridge; there is a prospect of over half a million being spent by the government on a custom-house, and a large amount of building is to be done and extensive street railway improvements are to be made. There ought to be more money in circulation in this city before long, and it is not unreasonable to look for a return of good times.

FORGED A NOTE.—C. W. Stricklin, a young man twenty-one years of age now lies in the county jail, having forged the name of J. M. Tracy to a note for \$50 at the Commercial bank. Last Friday he went to the bank and asked C. D. Latourette if he could get \$50 with J. M. Tracy as security and was told that it would be all right and a note was drawn up for that amount. On Saturday he returned with his own and Tracy's name on the note and presenting it when Mr. Latourette was busy and received the money. About an hour later the note was examined carefully and a striking similarity in the signatures noted. Officers were notified and failing to find him in Oregon City, E. Field, the constable, and D. E. Sheppard went to Portland after him where he was found in a short time with the money upon his person. Being arraigned before Esquire Fouts, he pleaded guilty and was committed to jail.

WHO IS HE.—On Saturday last a lady living at Sunnyside informed the Portland chief of police that a man, evidently an escaped convict, called at her house for something to eat. She heard a rap at the back door, and on opening it saw a man roughly dressed standing there. Both wrists were ornamented with handcuffs, and around his ankles were leg irons. The chains, however, had been parted, so that he could use both hands and feet. Around his waist was a belt, and in it a hatchet. He stated that he was almost starved, and begged for some cold food. The appearance of the man frightened the lady, but she gave him something to eat, after which he left the house and started east on the Base Line road. The police are of the opinion that the man has escaped from some officer in the country although there has been no report to police headquarters here of any such occurrence.

WORK ON BULL RUN.—The Portland water committee, having let the contract for constructing the Bull Run pipe line, is losing no time in making arrangements for the beginning of work says the Oregonian. A party of surveyors has been sent to the headworks to set stakes for the pipe, and another party is surveying and marking the site for the reservoir, on Mount Tabor and will set stakes for the line from Mt. Tabor to the river. The next thing probably will be to mark out the site for the big reservoir in the city park. This is intended to be a storage reservoir with capacity to hold a supply for the city for some days in case of accident. In a few weeks there will be a large number of men at work along the route of the pipe line, and the farmers through that section will find a near market for much of their produce this season.

LONG-DISTANCE TELEPHONING.—For the greater convenience of its patrons, the Oregon Telephone & Telegraphing company has opened a general telephone office at the corner of Third & Washington streets, Portland, equipped with sound-proof booths, for the purpose of secrecy and the shutting out of extraneous noises. From this office says the Oregonian patrons can connect with any of the principal towns in Oregon or Washington, or with any subscriber's station in Portland. The company is now constructing a line to Spokane, Wash., which will probably be finished early in the summer, and which will enable a person in Portland to speak direct to any one in Spokane. Persons in Oregon City can use this long distance line through the Oregon City office.

THE NEW DIGESTORS.—A gang of iron-workers are busy riveting together the plates for the new eleven foot digester at the Willamette paper mill and will have the first one completed and set by April 1st. The second will not be completed and placed much before the first of May. A new chip machine will be put in which will deliver the chips in the loft at the top of the building which is being built higher so as to permit the feeding of chips direct from the loft to the digestors by means of chutes. Heretofore cars have been used in filling the digestors.

A HUMAN FIEND.—Last Saturday Robert Black was seen upon the railroad track back of the cement mill, by John Kelly and others in a compromising position with little Grace Duncan a seven-year-old child. He was taken in charge upon a warrant charging him with attempt to commit rape and as the evidence was clear implicating him he was held under \$2000 bonds, in default of which he went to the county jail.

DAIRY SOLD.—Josephus Tompkins, the old and long tried dairyman has sold his dairy to Messrs. Catta & Bird, late of Portland who are experienced dairymen. The firm consists of C. H. Catta and T. T. Bird, who will give their attention to the business and intend to extend it as the growth of the place will admit. They have rented Mr. Tompkin's farm and will continue the dairy at the old stand.

MOST FEEL LONESOME.—The Portland Dispatch of March 3rd says: John W. Draper, of Oregon City was in the city this morning. He is a member of the democratic state central committee for Clackamas county. He states that he is not a candidate for register of the land office at Oregon City, nor for any other office under the incoming administration.
