THE ANNUAL MEETING LARGELY ATTENDED.

Directors Authorized to Borrow Money to Carry on School—Reports of Officers.

The annual school meeting was largely attended, chief interest centering in the election of director. After the several reports were read and disposed of, E. G. Caulfield was appointed assistant clerk and F. B. Charman and Chas. Babcock tellers. T. S. Lawrence and G. A. Harding were placed in nomination and the vote resulted in 123 for Lawrence and sixty-three for Harding. T. F. Ryan was chosen clerk without opposition.

The directors were authorized to borrow \$7000 or so much thereof as is necessary for the conduct of the school till the tax of 1893 is available. They were also instructed to select plans for a school house and to prepare to build. A petition was circulated asking the directors to call a meeting to vote \$6000 bonds for a new school building and the meeting has been called for March 27th at one o'clock.

REPORT OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS. In compliance with custom and the mandates of duty, we herewith submit the annual report of the board of directors of school district number 62, giving a brief account of our stewardship during the past year together with such recommendations as in our judgement will promote the best interests of the public schools of this city.

The reports of the clerk and superintendent give in detail facts concerning the past year's work, but they do not show that many unavoidable factors have conspired to make the year a trying one in many particulars, yet from out of which all things considered the school emerges in a prosperous and progressive condition.

Whilst the financial exhibit is satisfactory, showing as it does ample funds on hand for the conduct of the school till after the time when the tax has heretofore been available, yet we regret to have to state that owing to changes made in the laws at the recent session of the legislature it will be impossible to levy and collect a tax available this year; it will therefore be necessary to borrow money for the conduct of the school until April 1, 1894, or possibly later.

Subsequent to the preparation of their report, the board ascertained that several changes, not then known they had been made, and in looking them up they were found to be so conflicting that it was deemed best to employ an attorney to investigate the several laws and prepare an opinion for the guidance of the board at this meeting and we submit herewith the opinion of Judge Boise of Salem who was employed because the time was only brief and he had access to all bills and is besides an experienced jurist.

ately for the sale of bonds for the building of a school house and that a call for such meeting be circulated tonight, and the earliest possible date set so that the work of building may be begun.

3. That the board be instructed to select plans and to build a new school building on the site acquired last year, said building to be so planned as to permit additions without detracting from its architectural beauty, convenience and usefulness, the expense for the first six rooms not to exceed \$9000.
