Water pipes have been strung along Seventh street from Center to Jefferson, being the intention of the water commission to lay a six inch main along over Seventh street in order to give water service to that part of the city.

S. W. Moss made his first trip since his long confinement to the house on account of trouble with his head, down upon Main street on Wednesday Mr. Moss who came to Oregon in 1852 was born in Paris, Bourbon county, on the 7th of March, 1810. He is therefore 83 years old today.

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.

March Term—Foremen for Road Work—County Institutes Suit.

Petition of Mrs. Kate O'Neill et al for a change in the Abbott and Gribble Prairie road, ordered that Sidney Smyth, county surveyor, be appointed to survey and August Breimer, Eli Maddock and Wm. Knight appointed viewers to meet on Monday, the 20th day of March.

Application of the East Side railway company for right of way over the Portland avenue in Gladstone and Electric avenue in Shaw's addition granted and franchise allowed as prayed for, providing that in Gladstone it shall conform to grades of streets whenever it shall be incorporated.

Application of Wm. Tarrant for reduction of taxes not granted.

In the matter of correcting the boundaries between school districts No. 36 and 74, it appearing from the records that the sw 1/4 of sec 31, 14 s, 2 e should have been included in district No. 36, it was ordered that the same be corrected so as to include said quarter.

Petition of D. C. Latourette et al for a relocation of the Highland and Maple Lane roads granted. Sidney Smyth appointed surveyor and S. B. Califf, W. W. Myers and C. C. Babcock appointed viewers to meet March 21st at 10 a. m.

Report of W. H. Smith, supervisor of road district No. 2 on bridges built and repaired and paying for the same. Expense account amounting to \$230.57 allowed and ordered paid.

Petition of Rachael W. Bacon for a quit claim deed to lots 6, 7 and 8, block 131 in Oregon City referred to the county judge to look up the question of title and the clerk to act under his instructions in issuing deed.

Report of A. W. Cooke, supervisor of road district No. 1 on work done in his district approved and expense amounting to \$50.89 ordered paid.

Upon the application of Meade Post, No. 2, G. A. R., for relief for Mrs. H. J. Pierce, a soldier's widow, the clerk was authorized to draw a warrant upon the indigent soldiers' orphans' fund and for \$12 each month, to be drawn in favor of David McArthur, under whose direction it shall be expended.

Commissioner R. Scott was authorized to purchase one dozen road plows for use on the public highways and to ship three to each of the four outside road districts.

Report of W. W. Irvin on the improvement of the Oakley hill road approved, and the expense account of \$23.50 allowed. This exhausts the appropriation for said improvement.

Bond of C. W. Ganong as tax collector for \$50,000 approved. The bondsmen are H. H. Johnson and C. D. Latourette qualified for \$10,000 each. L. L. Porter, Geo. A. Harding, D. C. Latourette, E. G. Caulfield, Geo. J. Carrin and Wm. Barlow qualified for \$5000 each and Sidney Smyth for \$3000.

C. D. & D. C. Latourette attorneys submitted a proposition to collect the tax due upon the mortgage given by the Willamette Transportation and Lock Co. to Elijah Smith for 30 per cent of the tax collected, said fee to be contingent upon the collection of the tax which amounts to about \$5250, the county to bear court costs. The proposition was accepted and they as attorneys for the county directed to bring suit.

The court issued instructions to the several road supervisors.

Proposition of J. W. Potts to make list of property owned by the county, or upon which it has any claim by reason of bidding in at tax sale or otherwise, for which he was to receive \$1500 and ten per cent of the value of the prop-

erty found to which the county has a claim, not accepted.
