City Council.

There was much interest manifested in the council meeting on Wednesday evening, many citizens being present. A license was granted B. Lehman, and a remonstrance against its issuance from the M. E. church laid on the table. M. Heurth's license was renewed for another year.

A long remonstrance from the residents of the proposed second sewer district was presented and the establishment of that district together with the improvement were indefinitely postponed.

The ordinance for the improvement of Main street was passed and builders given till May 1st to submit bids which must be accompanied with samples of brick, which they purpose using.

The vote for chief and assistant engineer was canvassed and August Asmus and P. Metzner declared elected. The proposition to issue \$20,000 five per cent bonds to run 20 years was referred to the finance committee to report upon.

John Basseth asked to have the hours for gathering sloop amended so as not to run so much into the night, but the council refused to amend the ordinance.

Notice was ordered published that the council purposes to improve Fifth street by planking from Highland to Van Buren.

The New Ice Plant.

Mr. T. L. Armstrong, representing the Oakland Iron Works, is in the city superintending the setting up of the new ice plant for Smith & Lovett, and has about fifteen men at the work which he is pushing as fast as he can. The refrigerators just arrived on Wednesday morning and there is over a car load of the machinery yet to come, but it is on its way from the foundry and may come now any day. The plant which he is putting in here has machinery for a 50-ton plant, but the refrigerators will at present only have a capacity of 25-tons per day. The Oakland Iron Works, of which Mr. Armstrong is a member, have more in use on the Pacific Coast than all other companies combined and have been very successful in the work done. This machine when completed will be the largest on the coast.

Wm Barlow was in town the last of the week and says relative to the Canby, Barlow, Botteville road, that it was not the wish of the people of this county to have the road located where it now is, but that the people of Marion county entered such opposition to having it established on the county line that they were forced to have it established wholly in this county. He adds that the people of Marion have now signified their willingness to withdraw their opposition and permit the road to go on the county line, but if the road is not allowed to be established there they have nearly \$500 which will be used in opening up the road where it is now located.

That is a very neat and pleasant billiard and card room which A. L. Bean has fitted up on main street near the corner of Sixth. His opening occurred last Friday evening when he threw the doors open exposing to view a tastily arranged cigar and tobacco stand where he has on sale an elegant line of pure domestic and imported cigars. To Fruit Growers.

A meeting is called of all persons interested in fruit growing in Clackamas county, to be held at the court house in Oregon City on Saturday, April 15, at 10 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of organizing an association for the advancement of the fruit industry of the county. The principal objects of the association will be to work for a more extended market for our fruits and to discuss methods of planting, caring for and combating the insect pests now threatening our orchards, and to promote a more harmonious feeling among those engaged in developing one of the coming great industries of our county.

Indian Baskets.

Samples of the celebrated Indian baskets made at the St. Regis Reservation, Kansas, can be seen in the windows of Huntley's book store. They are made entirely by hand and the only tools used by the Indians are an axe, a knife and a hand splint cutter. A log of basket ash is pounded with a heavy polled axe until each year's growth of butt is easily pulled apart, separating with the fibre or grain of the wood into long thin strips. The outside white wood only is used. The Indians then reduce these wide strips to ribbon-like thinness by drawing them between the thigh and edge of a sharp knife. The thin strips are resplit into as narrow width as required by the use of a cutter the Indians make themselves. This is a small wooden block with a handle and on the other end having sharp pieces of thin steel set in the wood like the teeth of a comb. Then the block with a thin strip on it is held in one hand while the other grasps the end of the strip, pulling it through the sharp comb-shaped teeth, which divides the strip into thin narrow splints. The strips are then steeped in pans containing the various colors of dyes. The arrangement and mingling of these colors in the baskets is artistic; so perfect is the coloring that a few feet away the baskets look like willow interwoven with satin ribbons. They are worth an examination.
