Grand Encampment Meeting.

The delegates to the G. A. R. grand encampment, David McArthur, James Taylor, G. A. Harding, C. H. Dauchy, W. H. Burghardt and A. S. Lawton, returned from Pendleton on Friday, and report having had a most enjoyable time while away. On their way home they spent Friday evening with George Wright post in Portland, and were much pleased with their reception and the work done. The reports made at the encampment show: The number of posts is the same as last year, but the increase in membership is about 200 in the state. There was, as is always the case, considerable interest taken in the election of officers. The new officers are: J. C. Cooper, of Custer Post, No. 9, McMinnville, department commander; W. S. Brannin, of Kit Carson Post, Pendleton, senior vice commander; R. S. Greenleaf, of George Wright post, No. 1, Portland, junior vice commander. Considerable fun was brought out over the election when it was learned that these three principal officers were natives of Missouri. It was claimed that the Missourians had captured the convention and that the left wing of Price's army was again at the front in Eastern Oregon. Rev. G. W. Gue, of Lincoln-Garfield post, Portland, was elected department chaplain, and O. M. Dodson, of Baker City post, medical director. D. H. Turner, of George Wright post, was appointed assistant adjutant general. There are about 400 delinquent members on the rolls, and the encampment urged the adoption of vigorous measures to have them come to the front and settle. It was voted to hold the next encampment at Roseburg, providing satisfactory rates could be made with the railroad company. The delegates to the national encampment are Grannis, of Portland, and Prothro, of LaGrande. W. H. Burghardt was elected one of the alternates.

WASHINGTON, April 15.—The continued export of gold from this country to meet the Austrian demand has reduced the free gold in the United States treasury to \$1,800,000. It is the belief that gold will continue to be exported for some time, and in order to supply the demand for gold and replenish the depleted stock in the New York sub-treasury, it is stated the treasury department has been shipping gold from the treasury to New York for the past week. The amount thus shipped is thought to be not less than \$1,000,000, and it may be more. Snow in Northwestern Ohio. WASHINGTON, April 14.—The startling news from Honolulu, via San Francisco, of the hauling down of the United States flag, it is said, was the subject of animated discussion at the cabinet meeting today. Before going into the cabinet-room, Secretary Gresham said that he had received no information whatever aside from that printed in the papers. When questioned further as to the truth of the statements contained in the special dispatches to Western newspapers, that Blount was conveying at the restoration of Queen Liliuokalani and would support her to the throne, if need be, by the forces of the Boston, he said he knew nothing about it and declined to express any opinion on the subject. No More Gold Certificates. NEW YORK, April 15.—An order was received at the sub-treasury at New York today suspending the issue of gold certificates. This is in accordance with the provisions of the act of congress of July 12, 1892, which says that when the gold coin or bullion held in the treasury for redemption by United States notes falls below \$100,000,000 the issue of gold certificates shall cease.
