CIRCUIT COURT PROCEEDINGS.

Several Important Cases Disposed Of—Burns and Mack Sentenced for Life.

The case of J. W. Norris vs Daniel Boyer came up for confirmation of the sale of lots 5 and 6 in block 172 in Oregon City to J. W. Norris to satisfy a claim of \$421.47. The sale was confirmed.

The case of Ezra Hutson vs J. W. Bellow has been settled.

Last Friday the grand jury returned an indictment against W. W. McGuire, H. P. McGuire and W. S. Chapman for maintaining a dam across Johnson creek at Milwaukie which constitutes an obstruction which food fish can not pass. They were arraigned on Monday and asked for time to plead. On Tuesday they appeared by their attorney, Geo. C. Brownell, and entered a plea of not guilty. The time of trial has not been set and it is doubtful if it can come up at this session.

The case of the state vs Nathan Moody Stonewall Vaughn and Thad Stipp who were indicted for disturbing a public meeting at Macksburg, was tried on Monday and at 4 o'clock the jury retired. They were out till 1 o'clock and asked to be discharged on the ground that they could not agree. The judge accordingly discharged the jury.

The application of T. M. Miller to have the report of the referees set aside in the matter of the division of the Samuel Miller estate, was taken under advisement by the judge. The report referred to was made on the 18th day of February by the referees appointed after the report of the first referees had been set aside.

Thos Charman & Son asked to have the court authorize the present sheriff to issue a deed for property bought by them in the autumn of 1888 upon foreclosure against W. W. and Lizzie Stricklin as the sheriff at that time had failed to make a deed.

The case of the State vs John Colyer indicted jointly with Jacob Smith for stealing oats from a building was tried Tuesday and the jury returned a verdict of not guilty after a brief deliberation. When the verdict was read Mrs. Colyer who was with her husband, cried out repeatedly, "praise God," till the court ordered silence. The indictment against Schmidt was then dismissed on motion of the district attorney.

C. H. Jewell secured a verdict against Martin and Lizzie Bowers for \$400, and a lien on lots 8 and 9 of block 2 west side addition to Oregon City.

Effie Jones was divorced from her husband R. L. Jones, and granted the care of a minor child also alimony of \$10 per month.

The case of H. E. Cross vs G. C. Campbell to collect on note given E. L. Bently continued for the term.

Suit of J. J. Leavitt vs Henry Austin et al to quiet title. Order of court in favor of plaintiff.

The case of the State vs H. E. Cross, indicted for maintaining a dam across the Clackamas at Gladstone was tried on Wednesday. After being out all night the jury agreed to disagree.

Court will adjourn on Friday for the term.
On Monday Jas. Burns and Theron Mack were called up to have sentence passed upon them for the murder of the Chinaman at Mullino, and Judge McBride imposed a sentence of imprisonment for life.

GRAND JURY REPORT.

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Clackamas county.

To the Hon. Thomas A. McBride, Judge of the above-named court:

We, your undersigned grand jury for the April 1893, term of said court, make the following as our final report and respectfully represent—

That we have carefully investigated all charges of crime presented to us and have disposed of them in such a manner as we deemed warranted by the evidence. We have been called upon to investigate a larger number of charges of crime than usual but many of them by hearing both sides in the grand jury room, we have disposed of without presenting to the court.

We visited the county and city jail and we find them both well kept and in good condition.

Pursuant to the instructions of Hon. Thomas A. McBride, judge, we employed D. F. May, Esq., a competent expert to examine the books and accounts of the various county officers. He found all their books well kept and accounts correct. In his report is incorporated some recommendations about the recorder's office, which we adopt, in his report, statement of expenditures of the county since July 1st, 1892 to April 20, 1893, and statement of financial condition of the county, are herewith filed and made a part of our report.

We notice that among the assets of the county is a promissory note for \$600, unsecured. This note is past due and we recommend that the county court either collect the same or get it secured.

And now having completed our labors we ask to be discharged.

REPORT OF D. F. MAY.

To the Hon. Grand Jury of Clackamas County, Oregon.

GENTLEMEN: In pursuance to orders

by your honorable foreman, I proceeded to the examination of the several county offices. I made a careful examination of the accounts of the county clerk with the county treasurer's statement of the same in the matter of fees and fines in the county and circuit courts, and found them correctly kept and accounted therefor.

I also made a similar examination of the books and various accounts collected by the superintendent of county schools in the items of quarterly examinations of teachers and from the issuance of permits, and found the books properly kept and the accounts with the county treasurer to be true and correct.

The accounts of the sheriff's office were carefully gone over and compared with accounts in the county treasurer's office, and were found to be properly kept and true and correct by comparison.

The comparisons with the treasurer's office from the various offices directly connected with the same proved this office to have been carefully kept and correct entries made.

The honorable county judge was visited in his office at various times during my investigation and all information asked for was cheerfully given, which aided me much in determining many perplexing questions in the line of investigation mapped out by the grand jury.

I also wish to add that owing to the business of the circuit court very much of my work, especially in the offices of the county clerk and sheriff was necessarily done with the deputy county clerk and deputy sheriff, and I wish to say of these two officers that through their readiness to answer all inquiries and furnish records promptly my work has been shortened very materially.
