CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

A Lively Session—Several Important Ordinances.

Petition of A. W. Schwan for permission to erect a shed on his premises granted.

The chief of police reported having impounded and sold one horse for \$9.00 the expense of which amounted to \$8.95, the balance, 5 cents was turned over to the treasurer; also one steer for \$11.00, \$3.20 of which was turned into the city treasury.

The city recorder reported 19 arrests for May, 12 being for disorderly conduct, four of these paid a fine of \$5.00 each and seven went to jail. Seven were arraigned for being inmates of bawdy houses of which one was discharged, 5 deposited bail of \$10.00 each which was forfeited and one was fined \$50.00 which was paid.

The O. C. Mfg. Co.'s bill for the use of water to run old pump was not allowed and caused considerable acrid discussion. All ordinances relating to the declaration of nuisances were laid on the table as it was decided that nuisances should be declared by general rather than special ordinance.

Ordinances were acted upon as follows. For the improvement of Main street read and ordered published; changing the grade of Fifth street ordered published; Authorizing water commission to issue \$10,000 bonds, passed relative to improvement of Fifth street, laid on table one month; a remonstrance against the improvement of Main street was referred to the committee on streets and public property.

The committee on streets and public property was authorized to advertise for bids for the improvement of Main street said bids to be opened on June 19.

The old water commissioners were re-elected T. F. Ryan for one year, C. H. Caulfield two years, H. Straight three years.

Report of city assessor on sewer collections referred to finance committee.

Committee on health and police ordered to place a closet in the council building.

City engineer ordered to furnish a list of all property owners in sewer district No. 1, who have not connected with the sewers within two days. All owners will be required to connect at once.

Among the successful applicants for admission to the bar at the recent examination were Geo. L. Story and E. F. Driggs of this city. Mr. Story who has been studying in the office of Hon. G. E. Hayes, had the honor of standing at the head of the large class as he did not miss a question. Mr. Driggs, who has been a student in the office of Messrs. Latourette, also reflected credit upon his tutors by graduating with high honors.

The Portland Restaurant of this city has partially changed hands, Wm. Bohlander having bought an interest with L. Roconich. Under their joint management this popular restaurant will be made better than ever.

The concert given on Wednesday evening was not well attended though the character of the entertainment provided was such as to commend it to public favor. The trouble seemed to be that it was not properly advertised.

The base ball club have their grounds all fenced and the grand stand well along towards completion. It has a capacity for seating 400 people and will be ready for the first game on Saturday.

Marriage licenses were issued the past week to Annie Martin and A. F. Boylan, and Alice M. Warner and Geo. V. Ely.

INDUSTRIAL NOTES.

Work upon the West Side Scenic route has been progressing very favorably for the past two weeks and they are now beginning to get where they can see the beginning of the end. A large part of the rock work is done and the grading is so well along toward completion that the track laying can be commenced in a few days. The company would be pushing the work more than they are but they have received word from the builders of their cars that owing to the great demand for electrical goods they cannot ship the cars so as to have them here before the 15th of next month by which time the company are planning to have the line completed and everything ready for the rolling stock, then Ho! for a ride on the new road.

The Columbia is already getting high enough to interfere with work at the new power station and the company is not trying to do much in the way of building especially as there is every prospect that both it and the Willamette will rise much higher and seriously interfere with work at the foundation if it is begun before the waters recede and for this reason they are waiting but as soon as the river falls will at once begin to push the work as fast as it can be done.
