No appeal from temperance advocates can do more to promote the cause of temperance than the thrilling scenes and incidents so well described; at least so says Mrs. Mary A. Livermore and Miss Frances E. Willard. One of the most adsorbingly interesting portions of the book is that written by Inspector Byrnes giving the ripe experience of thirty years of detective life. Many of the startling revelations he makes are taken from his private diary. They have never before been published. The best of it is a pure and elevating book from beginning to end—a volume for the family circle. On this point the words of Rev. Dr. Twichell (who has a family of ten children) and Rev. ### NOTICE OF PROPOSAL TO IMPROVE MAIN STREET.

Notice is hereby given, that the City Council of Oregon City propose to improve that portion of Main street lying between that point on Main street where the line shaft of the cement mill crosses the said street and the north line of Sixteenth street, at the expense of the property owners and the East Side Railway company—

1st. By grading that part of Main street lying between the point on said street where the line shaft of the cement mill crosses the said street and the north line of Moss street to the established grade, and by paving same full width with a vitrified brick pavement.

2d. By bridging or trestling that part of Main street lying between the north line of Moss street and the south line of Twelfth street, full width.

3d. By grading that part of Main street lying between the south line of Twelfth street and the north line of Fourteenth street to the established grade, and by paving the same full width with a gravel pavement.

4th. By bridging or trestling that part of Main street lying between the north line of Fourteenth street and the north line of Sixteenth street, full width.

5th. By laying sidewalks on both sides of said street from the point on said street where the line shaft of the cement mill crosses said street to the north line of Sixteenth street, provided, however, that no sidewalks shall be laid where the walks now laid are in good condition, of proper width, and upon the established grade.
