

Rev. J. A. Eckstorm Ordained.

Last Sunday morning Rev. J. A. Eckstorm of this city was ordained in Portland in the presence of a large audience which filled Trinity church to overflowing. Quite a good many from Mr. Eckstorm's congregation in this city to be present and witness the proceedings and were much impressed with the ordination ceremony. Besides these there were gathered many notable divines from Oregon, Washington and California. The Ordination of Monday gave this interesting account of the ceremony:

Bishop Nichols, of California, Bishop Lewis, of this diocese, and a large number of clergymen, were present.

Bishop Nichols preached a strong and thoughtful sermon on "The Growth of the Kingdom of God," using Emerson's beautiful division of the utility of the symbol, the beauty of the symbol and the thing symbolized. He showed that we were very properly giving thought to the question of how the kingdom of God things advances the domain of common sense; also that the beauty of the symbol receives the attention, thought and inquiry of men, but that we do not think of the growth of the kingdom of God, which, while it includes the kingdom of nature, is not exhausted in the kingdom of nature. He made a point that if men would search for the great underlying principle interest would be increased and devotion strengthened. He then illustrated this general principle in the special subject of the sermon laid out by him for the occasion, in showing what the office of a priest is and ought to be, and how he should be esteemed by the people. He closed his sermon with an earnest and hearty exhortation to the candidate for ordination.

The candidate, accompanied by Rev. Sedgwick and G. B. Vanwaters, was then presented to the bishop of the diocese. The litany was said by the bishop of California and the anticomunion by Rev. G. B. Vanwaters, the epistle being read by Rev. George Plummer, of Corvallis and the cross by Dean Applegate, of Tacoma. The ordination then took place after the usual questions to the candidate. The bishop was joined in the imposition of hands by four presbyters, viz: Dean Applegate and Reva Cole, Sutcliffe and Vanwaters. Immediately afterward holy communion was celebrated, Bishop Morris being the celebrant. He was assisted by the reader.

Corvallis Bank Failure.

CORVALLIS, June 10.—The private bank of Hamilton, Job & Co. failed to open its doors for business this morning. The following notice was posted on the door: "We have been compelled to suspend for want of cash. Assets are sufficient to pay depositors in full as soon as they can be realized upon."

There was no preceding distrust apparent, but a steady withdrawal of deposits on account of the prevailing financial stringency. Assets are stated to be \$225,000 in money and notes, county securities and real estate. The liabilities are 205,000, of which \$171,000 are deposits. There is but little excitement and general confidence is expressed that the concern will be able to resume business shortly. The First National bank kept its doors open until six o'clock today.

A dispatch from Salem says: By the failure of Hamilton, Job & Co. at Corvallis last Saturday the funds of the state agricultural college to the extent of about \$20,000 were tied up with a good prospect of a considerable portion being lost. The college had on hand \$10,000 of the \$20,000 appropriated by the last legislative assembly for a building fund and \$10,000 belonging to the general expense fund of the college, of which latter sum \$3,700 had recently been received from the government for the experiment station. Treasurer A. R. Shipley of the board of regents had charge of this money. He gave bonds in the sum of \$40,000 with Hamilton, Job & Co. as sureties. The board authorized the treasurer to deposit in the bank that has burst. So now that the question of liability for the funds is considerably mixed.

Governor McKinley Renominated.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, June 8.—Governor McKinley today received the laurels of success, which presage perhaps, higher honors to come. The great protectionist in accepting the nomination as republican candidate for governor of Ohio virtually outlined the declaration of principals by which he may be judged as a candidate for the presidency. After the convention had been called to order the Duke of Veragua and party entered the hall amid loud applause. At this juncture Colonel Robert Nevins in an eloquent address nominated McKinley for governor. The nomination was made by acclamation.
