FURNISHING SCHOOL ROOMS.

As many new school houses are being built this summer a few words in regard to their furniture may not come amiss. Any one who has had occasion to use one of our ordinary school seats for three consecutive hours will be ready to admit that our schoolrooms should be supplied with the best seats. In selecting seats much care should be used. It may be found that in this as in many other things that the lowest priced are not always the cheapest. Single seats give the best satisfaction to both teacher and pupils there being by their use fewer opportunities for play or whispering, thus improving the order. Pupils like to have desks of their own, and can be better trained to habits of neatness and order. And although the first cost is more they last longer and will prove very little more expensive in the end.

Perhaps the most necessary article of school furniture is the blackboard; it is seldom that the country schools are sufficiently supplied in this respect. There should be at least a space three feet in length for each pupil, in fact all available space should be utilized.

A cheap and serviceable blackboard is made by applying liquid slating to any smooth surface. One gallon of slating will cover 250 square feet, three coats, and only costs eight dollars. The best board is ready made called hylolite it is made in sheets three and four feet wide and any length to ten feet. It can be cut with a common hand saw and easily nailed in position. The board is quite expensive being twenty-five cents per square foot. The blackboard should be four feet wide and come within two and one-half feet of the floor, thus giving the smaller pupils a chance to use it. In most school rooms the board is too high from the floor. In front of the pupils the board should be six feet wide, thus making room for daily program, examination questions, etc., without interfering with the working space.

There should be two cloak rooms partitioned off in the front part of the building for depositing wraps, one for the boys and the other for the girls. The entrance for the pupils is by a door leading into a small passage between the two closets. There should be an arched doorway opening from the school-room into these closets, the interior of them being always exposed to the eye of the teacher. The closets should be well supplied with clotheshooks and shelves for lunch baskets.

In this country of rain there should be some place provided for exercise in the open air. This may be accomplished by erecting a shed forty or fifty feet long and twenty feet wide, the sides may be open, and one end can be used for a woodshed. The cost would be trifling, the advantages many.

The value of a school depends greatly on the material one has to work with. It is poor economy to have poor or insufficient school apparatus. We would hardly expect our hired help on the farm to do good work with a wooden mouldboard plow. It will pay to pro-

vide an unabridged dictionary, a globe, reading and anatomical chart, etc. Many useful hints may be obtained from the article on "School Architecture in the School Law." TYRO.

NOTICE OF PROPOSAL TO IMPROVE MAIN STREET.

Notice is hereby given, that the City Council of Oregon City propose to improve that portion of Main Street lying between that point on Main Street where the line shaft of the cement mill crosses the said street and the north line of Sixteenth Street, at the expense of the property owners and the East Side Railway Company.

1st. By grading that part of Main Street lying between the point on said street where the line shaft of the cement mill crosses the said street and the north line of Moss street to the established grade, and by paving same full width with a vitrified brick pavement.

2d. By bridging or trestling that part of Main Street lying between the north line of Moss street and the south line of Twelfth Street, full width.

3d. By grading that part of Main Street lying between the south line of Twelfth Street and the north line of Fourteenth Street to the established grade, and by paving the same full width with a gravel pavement.

4th. By bridging or trestling that part of Main Street lying between the north line of Fourteenth Street and the north line of Sixteenth Street, full width.

5th. By laying sidewalks on both sides of said street from the point on said street where the line shaft of the cement mill crosses said street to the north line of Sixteenth Street; provided, however, that no sidewalks shall be laid where the walks now laid are in good condition, of proper width, and upon the established grade.
