## THE COUNTY COURT.

Reports of the Road Supervisors Show Good Work Being Done.

### CLERK'S ANNUAL STATEMENT.

**Bills Allowed—More Road Changes—Wood Wanted—For a County Physician.**

Report of viewers on Mumpower road approved and supervisor ordered to open road and to secure labor due from petitioners. Expense account of \$25.20 ordered paid.

Report of viewers on O. P. Hedge road approved and road ordered opened, the supervisor to use the labor of petitioners for that purpose.

Report of viewers on Fred Riem road approved and supervisor ordered to open the road with the labor due from petitioners. Expense account of \$38 ordered paid.

Report of viewers on Oregon City and Mack road filled and order made that the same will be approved upon the supervisor's filing his report showing that the new part of the road has been made as good as the old.

Report of viewers on Baker bridge and Fagolda mill road approved and road ordered opened. Expense of survey and viewing \$81.00 ordered paid.

Report of assessors of damages on the Rock Creek and Baker's Bridge road allowing Geo. E. Dyer \$150.00 in full for all damage, approved. Expense account for \$18 allowed.

Appraisers of damage on the Morris Wheeler road reported their finding had been made under a misapprehension of the facts and they were ordered by the court to meet again on the place of J. Lake on the 17th of July and make a full report to the court.

Report of appraisers of damage on the C. S. Porter road allowing on damages approved and the road ordered opened by the supervisor who will use the labor due from petitioners for that purpose. Expense account of \$9.70

Proposition of C. R. Dedman to sell the county an acre of ground suitable for a gravel pit for the sum of \$250 declined.

The clerk was ordered to notify the Southern Pacific Railroad company that the bridge over the track on the Walter Fish D. L. C. must be rebuilt without unnecessary delay.

Report of A. W. Cooke supervisor of road district No. 1 approved and expense account allowed as follows: Material, \$128.40 from county fund; supervision, \$96 from road fund; labor, \$1059.79 from road fund. Total \$1284.19.

Report of E. P. Carter supervisor of road district No. 3 approved and expense account allowed as follows: Material, \$50.74; supervision, 78; labor, \$881.21. Total \$1010.95.

Report of G. W. Prosser supervisor of road district No. 5 approved and expense account allowed as follows: Cost of material \$160.75; labor \$755.05; supervision \$46. Total \$961.80.

Report of W. H. Smith supervisor of road district No. 2 approved and expense account allowed as follows: Material \$616.59; labor \$2321.34; supervision \$80. Total \$3017.93

Relative to the application for an appropriation for graveling the Shuck's mill road it was ordered that when the people interested subscribe one-half of the cost the court will appropriate an equal amount.

Supervisor Prosser authorized to build the bridge as recommended in his report.

The county clerk was authorized to issue a warrant in favor of J. A. Chase in full payment for a gravel pit purchased in Park Place for the use of the county.

Application of P. H. Mulloy for a county road granted and Sidney Smyth appointed surveyor with D. W. Howard, E. P. Carter and Chas. Armstrong as viewers to meet at Barlow on Thursday July 24.

Report of the county judge on the expenditure of money allowed for the purchase of incidentals for the use of the county approved and the clerk authorized to draw a warrant to be expended by the judge in the same manner as heretofore.

Annual report of the county school superintendent approved and ordered on file.

Petition for the vacation of a part of the Quinn and Nolan road granted and Sidney Smyth appointed surveyor with T. P. Soules, A. E. Thomas and E. M. Hartman as viewers to meet at Marquam on the 21st day of July.

Report of C. Bair on the completion of the bridge on the S. B. Kent road approved and the clerk authorized to draw a warrant in favor of R. L. Morris for \$316 in full payment for the work.

The clerk was authorized to advertise for forty-five cords of body fir wood for the use of the court house to be delivered before the 15th of September.

Application of C. W. Ganong for further time in which to make his

annual report as sheriff granted and the time extended to August 9th.

The bids for the improvement of the Baker bridge and Fagolda Mill road for 1600 feet around Grimm's bluff being opened were as follows: Dan Lyons, 35 cts per cu. yd. \$3293.50; Payne & Connell, \$2275. The following named bid at so much per cubic yard: Boatman & Munsey, earth, 42 cents, solid rock \$2, loose rock, 42 cts; G. W. Church, earth, 31 cts, rock \$1; S. W. Aldrich, earth 30 cts, rock 95 cts. The contract was awarded to Connell & Payne who were over \$600 lower than the next highest bidder. A. W. Cooke was appointed to oversee the work.

Petition of T. J. McFarland for license to sell malt and spirituous liquors in Oswego precinct for period of six months granted.

W. H. Smith authorized to procure powder and bridge material as recommended in his report and to use the same in district No. 2.

Report of Supervisor Smith to the effect that parties were trespassing on the gravel pits owned by the county led to the issuing of an order to the effect that the several supervisors are charged with the care of all tools and with such county property as pertains to their labors and that they are to guard and protect the same in the name of the county.

Allowance for the care and keeping of Ole Hansen a pauper increased to \$11 per month.

Relief heretofore accorded W. Westfall an indigent soldier withdrawn as friends are now caring for him.

The clerk was authorized to advertise for bids from diplomated physicians for attendance and drugs for the county paupers for the year ending June 30, 1893 bids to be opened at the August term of court.

Annual reports of the county clerk and treasurer approved.

Mileage and per diem of the commissioners were allowed as follows: C. Bair, 5 days and 52 miles, \$20.20 R. Scott, 3 days and 18 miles, \$10.80.

### In The Columbia.

ANTONIA, Or, July 10.—The weird syren of the big white Monterey woke the echoes round the Columbia river bar at 5 o'clock this morning, and under the pilotage of Captain Grassman she was brought up to the harbor, steaming 13 knots, and dropped anchor in front of the city. All day thousands of people crowded the wharves and hills to get a look at the vessel. Her peculiarity of construction, the huge yellow smokestack rising from the center of the armament like a tower, and her gleaming white color makes the Monterey one of the most beautiful and graceful vessels that ever entered the river. And besides her huge shining turret guns stand out boldly from the breastworks and form another source of attraction. Captain Kemif has simply received orders from the navy department to leave here the 12th for Portland, and there await further instructions. The Monterey is now drawing 13 feet and 9 inches, with a displacement of 3900 tons. Her ordinary displacement will be 4100 tons when she receives the armor for her turrets, which was forwarded from Carnegie's shops in Pittsburg yesterday. At present the turrets are bordered with canvas.

### They Ate Salmon.

CHICAGO, July 11.—Director-General Davis, chief of the departments, president Higginbotham, Major Handy, and about 40 members of the press, accepted the hospitality of Oregon today, under the direction of President Myres, of the Oregon commission. A noon lunch was given to a number of invited guests on the roof of the transportation building. The occasion was the carving of the 82-pound royal chinook salmon which had been on exhibition some time frozen in the ice. The fish was baked and borne around the tables by two waiters before cut up. After an elaborate menu, wines and cigars were indulged in and toasts made to the waters of Oregon, which afford such splendid food for the palate.

### Boy Missing at Gresham.

GRESHAM, Or., July 11.—Willie Metzger, aged 16 years, left home yesterday morning with his gun for a short hunt in the woods near town. He told his mother when leaving that he would only be gone one hour. Willie has always been an obedient boy, and has never been absent before with out his parents' full knowledge. It is believed that he has met with an accident, and is either dead or lying mortally wounded somewhere in the forest. Citizens turned out last night and searched the woods all night for the missing lad with out success.

### Wind at Chicago.

CHICAGO, July 10.—A furious wind and rain storm passed over the city between 5 and 6 o'clock last evening, and caught many a craft on lake Michigan. Four persons are known to have been drowned, and in several cases boats were capsized and narrow escapes were had. By the capsizing of the sailing yacht Chesapeake, near the life saving station, the occupants were thrown into the water and four were drowned. Their bodies were not recovered.
