A Moral Reform Sermon—Death of Dr. Chas. Knight—Juvenile Good Templars.

CANBY. July 25.—Bishop Dillon, of the United Brethren church preached at the M. E. church Wednesday evening on the subject of moral reform to a large and attentive audience.

Died, at his home in Canby, July 22, Dr. Charles Knight, aged 64 years, 7 months and 12 days. The remains were laid to rest in the Canby cemetery. Dr. Charles Knight was for a great many years a familiar figure in and about Canby, having been one of the first to settle in the village. He was the oldest of the Knight brothers and took a prominent part in all public affairs. For many years he was proprietor of the only hotel in the place, and also ran a drug store in connection with his other business. For several years past he has been in failing health so that his death was not unexpected.
