Work Begun on New School House—New Post Office Fixtures—Death of an Old Lady Pioneer.

MILWAUKEE, Aug. 15.—The new school house has been started in earnest. Teams were put to work on the excavating Monday and it will soon be ready for the brick masons.

Milwaukee is gradually working to the front and we hope to see many more improvements. We are sadly in need of new sidewalks, and if the people would purchase the lumber at the present prices they could lay substantial walks and have them very cheap.

Postmaster J. C. Hungerford and his deputies, Gary and Wissinger, did themselves proud and are commented upon for their liberality in replacing the old post office fixtures with entire new ones having thirty-six lock boxes which are of solid bronze and are placed in position so the renters can get their mail any time during the day and evening from the outside. There are forty-eight call boxes and the usual number of general delivery. There are two windows, one for the money order department, the other for the delivery of letters. They are finely finished in brass. It is in all a very neat improvement and one that Milwaukee people feel proud of.

Her funeral occurred on Wednesday at 10:30 from the old homestead. The services were conducted by the Evangelical church in the German language. Mrs. Hagenburger was a woman of firm character and was highly respected in the community.

He gradually got worse and by the time they had got to Mr. Kruse's place Frank had utterly lost control of his voice.
