THE ENTERPRISE CORRESPONDENTS SWEEP THE FIELD.

News Notes—Forest Fires Burn Out Several Settlers—The Entire Neighborhood Threatened.

LACEY, Sept. 10.—On August 31st a forest fire ran through this section destroying considerable property. The houses and barns, together with household furniture, including clothing, &c., also hay and forage stored for the winter belonging to Ed. Miller, Clarence Swick and John Page, all of which was totally destroyed. Clarence Swick lost a fine buggy, also a saddle and harness. In fences, Mrs. H. Reid and J. R. Lewis were the greatest losers by the burning of several thousand rails. We had to call assistance from Springwater, thus saving the remainder of the settlement from destruction by fire. The fire was caused by campers or hunters. Now we, the settlers of this portion of the county, protest against hunters coming here and making fires and going away without extinguishing them. There is a law to prevent such carelessness, and we as a community propose to see the law enforced in the future, thus protecting ourselves and our property from fire.

Threshing is in progress at Springwater, but how the crops are turning out I am not informed. Mr. Guttridge threshed 2000 bushels of oats.

Wm. Lewellen and H. Dubois have purchased a new separator, and Doc. Howell bought the engine for his feed mill but will run with the machine during threshing.

Our school will commence on the 25th of September under the supervision of Mrs. Maggie Stout.

We are now having a fine rain, good for cabbage and late spuds, but bad for grain in the shock.

Ed. Miller proposes to rebuild on his place at an early day, to be ready, he says, for another fire. Clarence Swick will also rebuild this fall.
