An interesting case was tried before justice in Oswego last Friday which fully embraces the question of the force of the exemption laws which were enacted last winter. It seems that the firm of Rees & Co. levied upon the goods of L. B. Pierce for a bill of a little over \$50 which was made in buying supplies for the house. Pierce brought suit in the justice court against the constable, J. H. Welch to recover the goods and for a hotly contested suit lasting from 10 o'clock in the forenoon till 2 in the morning a verdict was returned by the jury in favor of Pierce, who was represented in the trial by his attorneys, Hayes & Story, while Rees & Co. were represented by Cake & Cake of Portland. It is said that the case may be appealed to the circuit court.

SCHOOL HOUSE DEDICATED.

Oswego Celebrates the Completion of Its Fine School Building.

Last Saturday afternoon all the people of Oswego who could possibly do so gathered at the handsome new school building for the purpose of participating in the exercises which were to set it apart for the use of the children of the district. The exercises were opened by music by the Oswego band after which a flag was raised upon the neat staff which had been placed over the building. Prof. S. W. Downs, principal of the school then called the meeting to order and introduced Superintendent H. S. Gibson who spoke of the American common school system and its advantages to the people who through it are enabled to acquire an education no matter what their condition. He concluded with a reference to the schools of Clackamas county and dwelt upon the improvement made in their conduct even since he became familiar with them. Prof. H. S. Strange was then introduced and after complimenting the people of Oswego upon the work accomplished spoke of the advantage secured by the common school and of the duty of parents to support them.

Prof. Downs then spoke for a short time dwelling upon the immediate work to be done by the teachers selected to conduct the Oswego schools for the year and stated that the teachers were entering upon the work with the determination to do all that they could to make the schools a success and requesting the active co-operation of all parents in the district. He then moved a vote of thanks to the band and to others who had participated in the exercises which was carried. He then moved a vote of thanks to the members of the board who have been untiring in their efforts to secure for the district a good school building. This motion prevailed with a hearty good will.

THE NEW BUILDING.

The building in which these exercises were held is a fine two-story and basement structure with four rooms upon each floor and is situated but a short distance from the old building only further back from the river and in a measure between the three towns which constitute the district. It is an imposing structure and can be seen from nearly all parts of the district and from the surrounding country. The grounds are very pleasantly situated and have been neatly fitted up so that everything is symmetrical and neat. Wm. Stokes of Portland was the architect and John Chandler the contractor. The four rooms upon the lower floor are so arranged that two of them can be thrown into one for an assembly room and these four only have been completed. The rooms of the second story will be completed next year or when needed.

The basement is fitted up with a play room, a furnace room in which are two fine furnaces furnished by E. J. Russell of Oswego, and two lunch and cloak rooms which are provided with hooks for the wraps and shelves for the dinner buckets. Benches are arranged around the sides for the children to sit upon and the rooms are so situated in relation to the furnaces that they will always be warm and pleasant. Being under lock and key and in charge of the janitor all wraps and lunches left there will be safe from molestation.

Miss Mollie Holmes has handed to this office several accounts of an interesting foot race at Anaconda, Montana, on the 23d of August and which was participated in by 8 firemen among whom was Percy Ingalls, who is well known in this place. The race was up a mountain some 1600 feet in height, the summit of which was over two miles from the starting point and the contestants were to make the run up this mountain over a rough road and turning round a flag come back to the place of starting. The time made by Percy Ingalls was 35 minutes and 15 seconds and from the fact that his closest competitor was only 15 seconds behind him at the finish it will be seen that he had no time to spare. As the mountain up which they raced has heretofore been nameless it is now proposed to call it Mt. Percy in honor of the winner of the race.

H. E. Gibson of Eagle Creek was in the city on Tuesday having come in over the new road down the Clackamas from Burghardt's mill at the foot of Deep Creek hill to the Baker bridge. He says the road can be gone over now but that it is not yet finished. On account of the newness of the grading it will not be good for travel after the winter rains set in unless it can be graveled, a thing which is impracticable this fall. Speaking of the saving in time he says that the difference in favor of the new road from Eagle Creek to Oregon City is not less than two and one-half hours, and that since a few have been able to go over the road they appreciate the advantage which it will prove to them.
