OSWEGO SURPRISED.

A Prominent Citizen Drugged and Committed to the Insane Asylum.

On the 10th of July last Geo. Smith, one of Oswego's prominent citizens, sold one of his teams and farming implements and rented his farm to one Chas. Eharhart of Portland and received in cash for the same \$550 with which amount he started for Portland intending to pay off a mortgage of \$300 that he owed on three teams, the one sold to Eharhart being one of the three included in the mortgage. After that he was never seen or heard of until yesterday morning when Constable W. H. Welsh who left here some time since, ostensibly on a pleasure trip to southern California returned with him, Smith having laid himself liable to criminal action by not paying the mortgage before his supposed flight.

Now comes the strange part in which some very clever detective work performed by Constable Welsh is brought to light. It seems that Smith on the night of his arrival in Portland stopped in several saloons and partaking of a considerable quantity of that which exhilarates. He finally wandered into a saloon on the east side where he met two confidence men who discovering that Smith was in possession of considerable money, made his acquaintance and invited him to take a walk when taking him into a saloon they quickly had him drugged and he knew nothing of his course until he came too in the insane asylum at Agnews, Santa Clara county, Cal., and heard everybody addressing him as Henry Webberly against which he protested declaring his name to be George Smith. For this he was ridiculed by the physicians and attendants as some mad raving of a diseased brain, no attention being paid to his repeated demands for liberty and the privilege of writing to friends was either denied him or the letters which he did write were thrown in the waste basket by the attendants. This continued from the 19th day of July, the day he was committed by the Judge of the Alameda court until finally gaining the confidence of the employees he managed to send a letter to Oswego in which however he failing to give any address or to state his circumstances, simply writing that he required funds. It was impossible for the parties to go to his assistance and while they were scouring the country with telegrams trying to ascertain his whereabouts Constable Welsh quietly walked into Oswego with him, having located his man by some means not known to the general public. LOST HIS FINGERS.

G. W. Swope has his Fingers Cut off by a Wood Saw.

A painful accident occurred on Thursday forenoon which resulted in the mangle of G. W. Swope's hand and the loss of all of the fingers. From an eye witness the following account was gleaned. Elmer Dixon's wood saw was cutting wood at the grocery store at the corner of Fourteenth street beside the track when the Gladstone car approached from the direction of town. Mr. Swope was standing upon the railroad track watching the saw and paid no attention to the car although the bell was ringing at the time, until finally John Gibson, the motorman shouted to him as did also several of the men working about the saw, then just as the car reached him he jumped from before it toward the saw and turning to look at the car he threw his hand out against the saw presumably to steady himself when instead of putting it upon the solid frame he laid it directly upon the rapidly revolving disc and in an instant all the fingers were severed nearly up to the palm of the right hand. It would seem that Mr. Swope either failed to realize that the car was approaching or was sort of spell bound and so unable to move in time to avert the sad accident. He was taken to Dr. W. E. Carl's office where the wound was dressed.

City Council Meeting.

The city council held a special meeting Wednesday evening and transacted a fair amount of business among which was the election of D. W. Kinnaird as recorder pro tem to act in the absence of Recorder Porter who has gone East on a visit. Mr. Kinnaird will collect street and other assessments during the absence of the recorder and may be found either at his own office over the Bank of Oregon City or at the recorder's office on Sixth street.

The recorder was authorized to advertise for bids for the construction of the bridge or approach leading from Green Point to the bridge on Sixteenth street, the building of which will make available and usable the new trestle at the north end of Main street. A part of the expense of building this bridge is to be paid by the East Side Railway company.

The council ordered the collection of one third of the Main street assessment at once.

The petition asking that the Preston map be placed on file was reported favorably by the committee and ordered on record by the council.
