

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.

Several Road Orders—Delinquent Tax Lists Ordered Prepared.

Report of viewers on Oregon City and Oswego road read and approved.

Claim of D. Magone and H. H. Johnson for \$500 damages filed and J. Casto, Frank Jagger and J. M. Findley appointed to appraise damages to meet on premises of H. H. Johnson Saturday, October 21st at 10 o'clock. Expense account of \$58.30 allowed.

Report of viewers on the M. F. Ambler application for change in Holliday territorial road filed and approved, new road ordered open, the supervisor to use the labor of petitioners only for that purpose and upon completion of new road the old will be ordered vacated. Expense account of \$21.60 allowed.

Report of viewers in the change in Union school house and Gresham road filed and approved and upon report of the supervisor of road district No. 1 to the effect that the new road has been made as good as the old it will be ordered opened.

Report of viewers in Burkhardt road approved and supervisor ordered to open new road with labor of petitioners. Expense account of \$45.20 allowed.

Report of appraisers of damages on Oswego and Springbrook road laid over till the November term.

Resignation of W. W. Jesse vs Justice of the Peace of district No. 7 accepted and J. D. Ritter appointed to fill the vacancy.

Clerk ordered to issue a warrant in favor of H. S. Gibson, county superintendent for the sum of \$70 on account of quarterly payment for school district reports in lieu of the fees.

Order of September term cancelling warrants rescinded so far as warrant 1121 drawn in favor of J. H. Darling is concerned and the treasurer directed to pay the same in its proper order.

W. H. Smith supervisor of road district No. 2 reported as follows: Expended for material \$116.46; labor, \$103.35; supervision \$20; total \$239.81.

G. W. Prosser supervisor of district No. 5 reported expenditure for labor of \$50.50; material, \$102.48; total \$152.98.

Report of P. S. Filteroff upon the improvement of the Oregon City and Apperson road approved and expense account of \$541.12 ordered paid.

Resignation of Asa Bullock as constable of District No. 2 accepted and W. H. Welch appointed to fill the vacancy.

Report of Sidney Smyth as to amount of extra earth excavated at Grimm's bluff by the contractors approved and clerk ordered to issue a warrant in favor of Payne & Connell for the sum of \$529. in full payment for said extra work.

Report of A. W. Cooke relative to the improvement of the Baker's Bridge and Fagolda's Mill road having been approved by the judge on the 12th day of September and the Clerk having issued warrants in payments therefore for \$1675, the action of the clerk is approved.

Action upon petition of C. T. Toozee for reduction of rates at Boone's ferry postponed till November 9 at 10 A. M.

Ivy M. Sawtell and Mattie B. Leavitt appointed to free scholarships at the State Agricultural College.

A. W. Cooke, supervisor of district No. 1 reported as follows: Labor, \$197.75; material \$129.03; supervision, \$40; total \$366.78. Report approved.

Upon the recommendation of A. W. Cooke supervisor of road district No. 1 there was appropriated \$300 to be expended by the supervisor in completing the grade and graveling the Milwaukee and Foster road. He was also instructed to procure the necessary material and repair the bridges reported in need of repairs.

Clerk ordered to issue warrants upon the county fund upon the report of Supervisor Cooke to the amount of \$314.25 toward expense of Baker Bridge and Fagolda Mill road.

Claim of John Locke for damages during riot at Champoe not allowed.

Contract awarded Ben C. Irwin & Co. to furnish books for the county records, to be supplied upon order of the county judge.

Report of R. Scott upon the completion of the Johnson Creek bridge approved and clerk ordered to issue a warrant in favor of the Pacific Bridge Co. for \$1634.00 in full payment.

E. P. Carter supervisor of district No. 4 reported as follows for September: expended for material \$9.89; labor, \$69.75 total \$79.64. Report approved and expense account ordered paid.

Petition of Chas. De Champlain for license to sell malt and spirituous liquors in Oswego precinct granted and clerk instructed to issue a license to cover the term of six months.

Supervisor W. H. Smith ordered to procure the necessary material and rebuild the bridge across Beaver Creek at Enos Cahills.

Proposition of George Broughton to purchase part of old plank on suspension bridge accepted.

Ordered that the suspension bridge at Oswego City be redecked without unnecessary delay, and John Baxter appointed to do the work under the supervision of the county judge.

County judge authorized to employ a suitable person to make a list of the delinquent taxes for the years from 1887 to 1891 inclusive.
