There is no farmer of good sense and good health, here or any place in Oregon, who cannot make a good living for himself and family, and that is as well as the majority of men are doing in other pursuits. The man who owns a farm and sticks to it is certain to profit by it in the future. There is practically no more land to be added to the area of cultivation. The supply of agricultural products has reached the limit in the United States and must now remain stationary, while the demand will go on increasing every year. This implies a gradual improvement in prices and a steady appreciation of the value of farming lands.

Agricultural College Notes.

CORVALLIS, Oct. 15.—With last Friday, the ending of two weeks of school, there were registered upon the college books 214 names of students, divided as follows: collegiate, 189; preparatory department, 25. The number taking the agricultural course is 32; mechanical, 85; household economy, 68; B. S., 4. In the first year are 91; second, 70; third, 20; fourth, 8. At the end of last year there were 282 names on the rolls, 98 being preparatory.

Before the beginning of the present year

the board of regents decided that no students would be admitted to the preparatory department from towns of more than 2000 inhabitants. To this can be attributed the diminished numbers in this department this term. On the other hand there is a larger number in the college proper.

The students from Clackamas county are identified with the following named classes: Preparatory—Ella Casto of Carus, Mattie Leavitt and Iva Sawtelle of Molalla.

Freshman—Gussie Casto of Carus, Anna Haugh of Marquam, and Louise Barnett of Oswego.

Junior—Randolph C. Shipley of Oswego, S. L. Casto of Carus, and Lester M. Leland of Oregon City.

Senior—Lyman B. Andrews of Oregon City.

Mrs. J. A. L. Casto of Carus, who was matron of the Girls' Hall last year, has again been chosen to that position.

The green house, the brick cellar adjacent to Cauthorn Hall, and the addition to the barn are completed. The new addition to the mechanical hall will be ready for occupancy in about two weeks. The aggregate cost of these improvements will amount to about twelve thousand dollars.

The college authorities are preparing for the meeting here of the State Horticultural Society the latter part of the present month.

HIGHLAND HAPPENINGS.

Sudden Death of S. H. Scribner Who Fell Forward While Seated at Breakfast.

HIGHLAND, Oct. 17.—Died, at his residence in Highland, Thursday morning, October 13, from a paralytic stroke, Samuel H. Scribner, aged fifty years, nine months and twelve days.

Mr. Scribner died very suddenly without any warning whatever, while seated at the breakfast table with his married daughter and son-in-law, apparently in the best of health and spirits. He was formerly from Vermont—a genuine Yankee,—to which frequent allusion was made in his jokes and merriments. He was very industrious, a skilled mechanic, enterprising, intelligent, and highly esteemed in the community.

At one time he was justice of the peace for Highland precinct. He served in the Union army during the civil war, of which fact he was very proud. Rev. Malloy of Oregon City conducted the funeral services. The remains were buried at the Harmony graveyard.

An entertainment was given at the K. of L. hall at Highland on the 14th instant under the management of A. Coles. Edison's famous phonograph was exhibited, songs and speeches were rendered which were enjoyed by all present. After which a social hop was indulged in by the young folks, which of course is always in order and always appreciated.
