COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.

The Business of the November Term Lighter Than Usual.

The report of the assessors of damages upon the Oswego and Springbrook road was approved and upon the payment of the amount allowed by petitioners the road will be opened.

Report of assessors of damages upon the Oswego and Oregon City road laid over till the December term.

Upon application of E. Mathies for correction of his tax receipt and the repayment of \$2.50, the amount overpaid, the clerk was authorized to issue warrant and the sheriff directed to correct the receipt.

Petition for the vacation of certain streets in town of Marchbanks granted.

Report of R. S. McLaughlin upon the improvement of the Milwaukie and Clackamas road approved.

Report of G. W. Prosser, supervisor of road district No. 5 for October showing cost of material to be \$12.80, labor labor \$17.75 and supervision \$6, was approved.

An allowance of \$20 per month to date from the 7th of November was ordered issued to Ida Barrett for the care and keeping of Calvin Harrington.

A. W. Cooke, supervisor of road district No. 1 reported \$340 expended for material, \$371.68 for labor and \$16 for supervision for the month of October. The report was approved.

Report of A. W. Cooke upon the Milwaukie Foster road shows expenditures as follows, balance of appropriation of 1892, \$45.65, appropriation of 1893, \$300, appropriated at this term of court \$22.64, making the total expenditure \$396.29. Report approved.

Report of Judge Meldrum relative to incidental expenditures read and approved and the clerk authorized to draw a warrant in favor of the county judge to be expended in like manner.

The report upon the Baker bridge and Fagald mill road showing the cost of clearing away the slide at Grimm's bluff to be \$114.22 was read and approved.

Warrant ordered issued to J. E. Rhodes for \$60 in part payment for copying maps from the government land office.

Report of E. P. Carter, supervisor of road district No. 4 showing expenditure for work and material of \$62.42 and supervision \$48 approved.

Report relative to the protection of the Dickey bridge across the Molalla at a cost of \$45 approved and expense account allowed.

Relative to the improvement of the Shucks Mill road it appearing that the parties interested have contributed labor to the amount of \$75.85 there is allowed for additional labor which is shown to have been done the sum of \$80.

Action relative to the payment of the assessments for the improvement of Main and Fifth streets was laid over till the December term.

Petition for the reduction of ferryage rates at Boones Ferry denied.

W. H. Smith, supervisor of road district No. 3 reported road expense \$109.22 bridge \$55.59 and supervision \$16. Report approved.

The sheriff was authorized in accordance with the report of the district attorney to accept the sum of \$200 from Wm. Tarrant in settlement of the suit for his taxes for 1892.

Application of Alexander Catto upon behalf of Bishop Morris for rebate of taxes for 1892 not granted.

Relative to the collection of the tax upon mortgages where an affidavit has been filed with the sheriff to the effect that the mortgage was paid but not cancelled prior to July 1st, 1892, the sheriff is ordered to collect the tax unless it is shown by such affidavits that it is a

double assessment or that the debt has been included in a new mortgage upon which the tax has been paid.

Report of W. H. Smith upon the improvement of the Forsythe road showing an expenditure of \$76 approved and the account ordered paid.

Report of P. S. Filteroff upon the improvement of the Oregon City and Apperson road showing an expenditure of \$191.50 approved and the account ordered paid.

Mileage and per diem allowed as follows: C. Bair, 4 days and 28 miles; C. Bair 1 day, extra 14 miles, \$4.80; R. Scott, 4 days and 18 miles, \$13.80.

The report of the sheriff relative to collection of taxes for 1892 was approved except the reductions permitted to D. W. Reynolds, Mrs. D. E. Booth, G. Kuenzi, Wm. Stubbs and Jacob Elmer and the sheriff was directed to continue the collection of taxes for 1892 and report at the December term.

Clackamas County Tax Roll.

The Enterprise last week gave the figures showing the amount of taxable property in Clackamas county, but as the books had not been completely footed up, it was impossible to give all the totals. In order to place the result of the assessor's work before our readers, the totals as shown upon the tax roll are here given, and compared with those of last year they make a very favorable showing relative to the growth of the county during a year not noted for advancement in material prosperity. Following are the figures as submitted by Assessor J. C. Bradley to the county clerk in the tax roll roll turned over to him the first of the week:
