

CIRCUIT COURT NOTES.

Peculiar Session Passing With Little Work for the Trial Jury.

Circuit court convened one week ago last Monday and on Wednesday of this week the first jury was summoned. The mere fact that the jury was not called does not indicate that the court was not busy for as a matter of fact the session of the court thus far has been a busy one and a great deal of business has been transacted but it was of such a nature that the services of a jury were not required to assist in settling them. The first few days of the term were largely devoted to motions and rulings, the record of which is not interesting reading to the general reader.

The grand jury has been engaged all the time and has returned several true bills, among which were the following: E. Duncan for assaulting his wife with a lamp. Prisoner pleaded guilty to assault and asked for the mercy of the court. The judge in sentencing him said that a man who would assault his wife was not entitled to clemency and gave him sixty days in the county jail.

H. J. Thompson alias Carroll who executed a draft on a San Francisco bank and obtained \$100 from the Commercial bank pleaded guilty to obtaining money under false pretenses and was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary to which he was taken Tuesday night.

Henry Diekmann was indicted for assaulting with a mallet and having blood guilty was sentenced to pay a fine of \$50 and costs.

In the case of the state vs Edward the jury returned not a true bill.

The only case thus far brought before the trial jury was that of A. Laelling vs Frank Beers involving the payment of \$50 which the defendant claimed to have paid defendant but for which he had no receipt. Verdict for the plaintiff.

Suit of John Weismandel vs W. Gribble for \$225 and interest. Verdict for the plaintiff for amount claimed less \$25 admitted to have been received.

In the case of the State vs Geo Smith indicted for larceny. Prisoner was given time to plead.

Major A. LaMotte was granted a divorce from his wife Frances LaMotte.

Viola Stubbs was granted a divorce from her husband John Stubbs on the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment.

Henry A. Pusey was granted a divorce from his wife Julia Pusey.

Maudie Will was granted a divorce from her husband David Will.

The suits relative to the collection of bridge taxes brought by H. E. Cross against Sheriff Ganong were decided in favor of defendant. A temporary injunction was granted which was afterwards dissolved and the sale of the sure attached permitted to proceed.

Sundry suits of wholesale merchants against Geo. A. Walling on account were decided for plaintiff by default.

In the case of the State vs P. A. Martin the record states that Geo. Dunphy, Robert Baty and Peter Laferty, important witnesses could not be found in the case was continued till the next term.

Last Sunday morning E. M. Mack, man in the ENTERPRISE office, received the sad intelligence that his mother Mrs. Frances Lillian Van Cleve died at the home of his grandmother in Baker City the previous evening. Mrs. Van Cleve had been ill for a long time and her death was not unexpected. Mr. Mack returned from a visit to her while the first of last week.

Mr. Pierce the mail carrier from Oregon City to Mulino brought word on Tuesday that the house of Joseph Elmer of that place had been consumed by fire the previous evening. The exception of the contents of the lower floor which were carried out, the house and contents were a total loss.

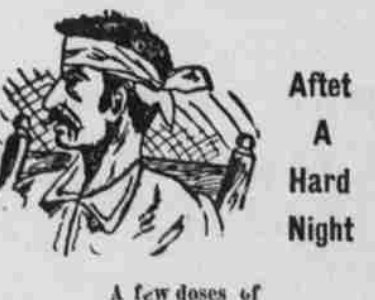
