A New Chinese Treaty.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—It is probable the Washington treaty will soon enter upon negotiations looking to the adjustment of the relations with China. The enactment of the Geary law will be regarded as an infraction of the existing treaty, necessitating a new treaty. It is understood that Gresham desires made an extension of the trade relations and the privilege with China as the central feature of his administration. The Chinese government is satisfied with the amendment to the Geary act and is not anxious to extend the privilege of immigration for their people, but is solicitous for their protection and privileges.

Big Battle in Brazil.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—The navy department has received a cable from Commander Picking at Rio Janeiro, which says the battle expected in the harbor has begun. Copas island and Enchadas are in possession of Admiral de Gama, insurgent commandant. The former is

well fortified, and is continually firing on the custom-house and naval arsenal. Commander Picking also cables that Consul Berke, at Pernambuco, wants a vessel as a precautionary measure, martial law having been declared, but all is quiet.

MELLO AGAIN OUTSIDE RIO.

BUNKER AYRES, Dec. 13.—Admiral Mello's flagship Aquidaban is again blockading Rio Janeiro. Communication between land and shipping in Rio bay has been stopped.
