HANSEN WILL HANG.—The Oregon supreme court has affirmed the judgment of the lower court in the case of the state, respondent, vs. John Hansen, appellant, and unless Governor Penroyer can be prevailed on to commute his sentence to life imprisonment Mr. Hansen will be the principal participant in a neck-tie party at Astoria in the near future. The particulars of the crime and trials are as follows: On Wednesday, July 20th, last, he murdered his wife, Caroline Hansen, while she was engaged in picking raspberries at their home in Clatsop county. The deed was committed with a stick about a yard in length with a knot on one end. The blow was upon her head. This occurred about 4 p. m. Hansen made a confession on the following Saturday to the sheriff, H. A. Smith, and F. I. Dunbar. His wife died almost instantly and, after remaining by her side for about an hour, Hansen went to a neighbors place and told him what he had done. During the evening he burned the stick in the stove in his home. He was indicted and convicted of the crime of murder in the first degree. A motion for a new trial was overruled by Judge T. A. McBride and Hansen was sentenced to be hanged. An appeal was taken to the supreme court upon the grounds of errors being made in admitting certain evidence and the giving and refusal on certain instructions by the court. The defendant's counsel contended that the court should not have admitted. This will be the second tie party for Sheriff Smith, within six months.

K. OF P. ANNIVERSARY.—Monday evening Achilles lodge No. 38 K. of P. of this city met in their cosy hall together with a number of their invited friends to celebrate the Thirtieth anniversary of the founding of the order and passed the evening in listening to an interesting program consisting of music, recitations, readings and a short address. The address by E. M. Kands and the reading by I. L. Hoffman took up the historical and beneficial features of the order universal. The songs by Mrs. E. E. Charman and Miss Ella Hoberg were excellently rendered while the music furnished by the Oregon City Glee Club was roundly applauded. Matt Brown with his Indian club swinging pleased the audience immensely with his wonderful skill in their use while F. J. Louis—well words can't do justice to him in his inimitable imitations. He fairly outdid himself when he imitated the catching of the porker, and riling up displayed to the audience the caudal appendage and one foot of the pig with the exclamation, "He got away."

PAYING THE COUNTY.—Sheriff Ganong is much surprised at the way in which taxes are being paid in as he had expected that but few would come in this early in the collecting time and liquidate with the county. Many are coming forward and paying in full and from present indications the present year's collections will not be greatly behind other seasons.

PLenty OF BOATS.—According to the Statesman Mitchell, Wright & Co. of Salem completed arrangements to take charge of the Oregon Pacific steamer, Wm. M. Hoag, and to place it in competition with the other boats on the Willamette river. There is one thing sure, with the Altona, Elwood, Modoc, the new Eugene, and now the Hoag, (besides towing and other boats from Portland,) something is going to "bust." Rates are at present so low that there is no money in carrying a good deal of the freight. Then it must be remembered that there is not enough freight to be handled here on an average to make more than two boats rich. With five competing boats and only enough traffic for two, the result can only be surmised.

COLUMBIA RIVER MAILS.—The Oregon Short Line & Northern railroad, otherwise the Union Pacific, has been awarded the contract for carrying the mails between this city and Astoria and way ports till June 30, 1896, for \$12,000 per annum, an advance of \$3000 a year over the old rate. This means that the steamers Telephone and Thompson will continue giving the residents along the Willamette and Lower Columbia daily mails from either end of the route. The contract provides that, if practicable, the company shall also forward mails by its own or any other night boats that may be running.

TO THE REFORM SCHOOL.—The Statesman notes that Edward Saunders, aged 14 years, was committed to the state reform school yesterday by Circuit Judge Burnett. He is one of the lads that burglarized the store of Vandeleur & Bents at Butteville about two weeks ago when \$116 and other valuables were taken. Owing to their age District Attorney McCain concluded not to prosecute their case and they pleaded guilty to petit larceny. The youngest one Fred Jennings was sentenced to the county jail for one month. There are now seventy-five boys at the state reform school.

NEW MEETING PLACE.—Meade post has made arrangements to hold meetings in future in the A. O. U. W. hall at which place they will first meet on the evening of the 5th of March. NOTES FROM ELWOOD.—Sometime since the postoffice named Elwood was discontinued on account of the removal of the postmaster. Mr. G. H. Kerns of that place was in the city on Monday and reports that the people of that section miss the office very much and states that a petition is now being prepared to have the office re-established with him as postmaster. Miss Nellie Younger began a short term of school in the district there on the 5th.

ABOUT ABRAHAM LINCOLN.—A delighted audience listened Sunday evening at the Congregational church to a patriotic address by Mr. Shorey on the "Life and Work of Abraham Lincoln." This address was originally prepared for the Grand Army and has been received with enthusiasm wherever delivered. Mr. Shorey has other similar addresses on Logan, Grant and Garfield, that by request will be delivered in the near future. Dates will be announced.

SELECTED THE BEST.—Mrs. S. B. Califf now mourns the loss of about twenty cans of her best fruit which was taken from the root house some time last week in the night and packed off. In taking the fruit the thief selected only the best kinds including all the peaches in the cellar. Capt. Califf says that while the party is known he is not disposed to make trouble if the jars are returned to his place minus the fruit.
