Republicans to Organize.

On Wednesday evening there was a meeting of the officers and executive committee of the Young Men's Republican club of this city for the purpose of getting the work of organization well in hand. Those present were: Chas. Meserve, president; Henry Melarum and J. L. Swafford, vice-presidents; T. P. Randall, secretary; E. E. Williams, treasurer; H. E. Smith, T. W. Sullivan, Henry Gilbert and J. N. Harrington of the executive committee.

The evening was devoted to a discussion of plans for the campaign and much interest was evinced by all present. It was decided to work in conjunction with the county central committee in promoting the organization of the county and all republicans throughout the county who are anxious to have clubs organized are invited to correspond with the secretary of the club on organization for the purpose of securing information and if needed help in the way of speakers.

It was deemed desirable to have a glee club organized within the club and to make the exercises at the various meetings as varied as possible. It was decided to hold two meetings in March, two in April and four in May. The first meeting in April will be on the evening following the meeting of the republican convention and it is the intention to make it a grand ratification.

It was expected that the constitution and by-laws would have been ready by this time, so that clubs throughout the country could be supplied, but they have not yet been sent out. As soon as they are ready they will be sent to those who have requested them.
