A GARDEN WHEEL MARKER.

Let There Be Straight Lines and Regularity In the Vegetable Garden.

While I admire the hit or miss style of nature in landscape gardening and the easy abandon and grace of irregularity in ornamental planting, I believe in iron-clad regularity in the vegetable garden and can see a great deal of beauty in the straight lines and the uniform distances which I always try to establish in my onion or carrot beds, etc.

The ordinary, old style garden markers, which are calculated to be drawn horse fashion, have never satisfied me. They either require the work of two persons, one to pull the marker and the other to guide it, or compel the person who undertakes to operate a machine of this kind alone to walk backward.



what I want. Where light marks only are needed, as for setting out onion and other vegetable plants, I think the wheel marker here described will answer its purpose admirably.

The wheels may simply be cut out of inch board and beveled off at the edges. They revolve around an iron rod and are held at the desired distance by pieces of 4 by 4 inch scantling, through the center of which, long-tines, is bored a hole of corresponding size.
