Every Precinct Sends In a Full Delegation.

DELEGATES ALL ENTHUSIASTIC.

And Promise a Big Victory for the Party in the June Election.

GOOD MEN WERE NOMINATED

The Enterprise Gives a Full Report of the Convention and Its Doings.

The convention was called to order by County Chairman Brownell and L. L. Porter was chosen temporary chairman and J. W. O'Connell, temporary secretary. The following committees were appointed:

West Oregon City—Relative to this precinct which is entitled to three votes in the convention we recommend that two delegates of the Smith delegation be seated, and one of the Ford delegation, and that these delegates be H. E. Smith and Wm. Godbold of the Smith delegation and George Losey from the Ford delegation.

Upon the assembling of the convention after the noon recess the temporary organization was made permanent. J. W. O'Connell asked to be excused from

servng as secretary and J. U. Campbell was elected instead.

Following the adoption of the order of business the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That we charge the democratic party with being directly responsible for the present industrial and financial depression. That we condemn the Wilson tariff bill as destructive to the agricultural and industrial interests of Oregon, and we demand that Congress at once pass a joint resolution endorsing the McKinley bill and Bill McKinley, and immediately adjourn and go home.

Resolved, That we are in favor of honest money and a parity of gold and silver. We believe that an international agreement by the leading civilized nations of the world to maintain such parity between gold and silver should be reached at the earliest possible date.

Resolved, That we demand a constitutional convention at the earliest possible date for the purpose of revising the constitution of Oregon and including therein the initiative and referendum in its strongest form.

We demand that all our candidates pledge themselves in writing to accomplish this result, and hereby instruct our delegates to the state convention to use all honorable endeavors to make this resolution a plank of our state platform.

Resolved, That we are in favor of electing precinct road supervisors and each election precinct expending the funds belonging to it within its own boundaries.

Resolved, That we are in favor of immediate legislation restricting foreign immigration so as to prohibit the introduction of the foreign pauper and criminal class into our country and we demand that such laws be rigidly enforced.

Resolved, That we are in favor of changing the assessment laws so that all assessments shall be made by precinct assessors elected in each voting precinct.

Resolved, That we recognize the great obligation we owe to the defenders of the republic and we would recommend to the republican state convention to take suitable action in reference thereto.

Geo. C. Brownell was then nominated by acclamation for senator and being called upon made a short eloquent and stirring speech in favor of the principles of the republican party. He was cheered to the echo, showing the convention to be heartily in sympathy with his nomination.

The following were chosen to attend the congressional convention: E. C. Chapman, R. Scott, William Mattoon, C. Bair, C. U. Barlow, J. F. Nelson, C. N. Greenman, Herman Vorpahl, Charles Meserve, William Boring, J. H. Pomeroy, E. M. Hartman and C. F. Toozie. They were instructed by the following resolutions to support Hon. Binger Herman for congress.

WHEREAS, Hon. Binger Hermann, our able representative in Congress is now at his post of duty at the capitol of the nation performing great and valuable services for the people, who has been true and able in the performance of his duties, should be again commended to the people of this congressional district for renomination and election, it is therefore resolved, that we the delegates in the Republican County Convention in and for Clackamas county do hereby instruct our delegates to the Congressional convention at Salem to use all honorable means to secure the renomination of Hon. Binger Herman as the standard bearer of the republican party for congressman for this congressional district, and to vote for him as long as his name is before that convention.

The following resolutions endorsing Captain J. T. Apperson's candidacy for governor were unanimously adopted.

WHEREAS, The name of Captain J. T. Apperson is favorably mentioned in connection with the office of governor of the state of Oregon, and we repose the ut. most confidence in his ability, honesty of purpose and eminent fitness to fill the office in an acceptable manner to the people of this state, and believing further that his election as governor at this time, will result in a wise, safe, careful and economic administration of the affairs of this state, it is hereby Resolved. That we most emphatically indorse his candidacy and do by this resolution instruct the delegates to the state convention to urge his candidacy by all honorable means until such time as he himself may consent to their withdrawal of support from his candidacy.

Following is the vote for delegates to the state convention, the first thirteen being those chosen: Geo. C. Brownell, 112; Charles Holman, 104; F. C. Harlow, 95; Frank Kruse, 102; H. E. Smith, 100; Thomas Charman, 107; Frank Jaggard, 85; Charles F. Clark, 105; H. E. Cross, 82; George W. Prosser, 61; J. I. Dozier, 100; G. E. Hayes, 99; F. A. Melnig, 62; F. L. Mintie, 31; F. M. Osborn, 9; Henry Wilbern, 52; J. W. Roots, 13; T. E. Campbell, 20; J. W. O'Connell, 9; C. S. Porter, 11; H. L. Patterson, 9; L. Pardue, 11; D. W. Kinnard, 8; W. C. Ward, 10; D. B. Rees, 8; H. S. Strange, 7; J. H. Wolfer, 7. Other scattering votes were cast.

But one ballot was necessary to determine who should go on the representative ticket and that stood as follows: Dr. C. B. Smith, 95; Geo. Rinearson, 91; Wm. Barlow, 66; Geo. W. Swope, 47; C. C. Hoops, 13. The first three named were declared the nominees.

It took two ballots to decide the county judge question. Upon the first Gordon E. Hayes received 48 votes, T. F. Ryan

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39, H. H. Johnson 16. W. W. H. Sampson 8, Jas. M. Tracey 7, scattering 3. Before the second ballot H. H. Johnson and Jas. M. Tracey withdrew in favor of G. E. Hayes and as a result of this action the second ballot stood Hayes 75, Ryan 45, Sampson 4. Gordon Hayes having received a majority of all votes cast was declared the nominee.

There were seven candidates for commissioner and it took three ballots to make a choice. The first ballot stood John Kruse 23, Frank Jaggard 35, A. J. Yoder 15, John L. Erie 19, Jacob Miley 5, Henry Dubois 10, D. A. Jones 2. At the close of this ballot D. A. Jones withdrew and the second ballot stood Kruse 32, Jaggard 51, Yoder 2, Erie 19, Dubois 10, Miley 7. Henry Dubois and John L. Erie then withdrew and the third ballot resulted in the selection of Frank Jaggard as the nominee, the vote standing Jaggard 95, Kruse 18, Miley 7.

The convention then adjourned for supper, after which the contest over the selection of sheriff began. There were seven candidates in the field and it took four ballots to make a nomination. The first ballot stood J. A. Talbert 19, E. C. Maddock 35, G. W. Prosser 18, Wm. Thompson, 9, J. F. Nelson 6, A. B. Marquam 25, W. H. Smith 11, J. S. Purdom who had not been placed in nomination received 1 vote. On the second ballot Marquam received 24 votes, Maddock 48, Prosser 20, Smith 7, Talbert 12, Thompson 6, Nelson 3, Purdom 1.

At the close of the second ballot Thompson withdrew and the third ballot gave Marquam 28, Maddock 59, Prosser 26, Talbert 9, Smith 1. The fourth ballot resulted in the selection of Maddock, and when the count revealed the fact that he had several more than enough to elect a motion was carried with a whoop to make his nomination unanimous, which was done, whereupon the convention went wild.

Following the selection of the nominee for sheriff the several officers now holding their first term were nominated by acclamation and with each new selection of a candidate the convention and spectators turned themselves loose and the wildest enthusiasm prevailed. Each candidate was required to step forward, shaking hands on every side as he did so and when at the front was made to mount a chair and make a speech. Those nominated by acclamation were Geo. F. Horton for county clerk, S. M. Ramsay for recorder, J. G. Bradley for county assessor, H. S. Gibson for school superintendent, and R. L. Holman for coroner. Holman thanked the delegates and said that if they and all republicans did their duty on the 4th day of June that he as coroner would have a big job on the following day, and that was to sit on all of the populists. This brought the convention down in great shape.

There were six candidates for treasurer and it took two ballots to nominate. Upon the first A. S. Lawton received 13 votes, M. L. Moore 40, R. W. Porter 12, J. G. Porter 26, Geo. Knight 28 and L. W. Davis 1. R. W. Porter, L. W. Davis and A. S. Lawton withdrew from the contest at the close of the first ballot and on the second M. L. Moore was nominated, receiving 78 votes. Geo. Knight received 26 votes and J. G. Porter 15.

D. W. Kinnaird and I. L. Hoffman were placed in nomination for surveyor and while the contest was close it took but one ballot to decide, the former receiving 60 and the latter 58 votes.

At the close of the convention which adjourned at 11 o'clock in the evening the members of the central committee for the coming year met in the hall and organized by the election of Henry Meldrum as chairman and Geo. L. Story as secretary.

The Philomathean Society.

In reply to frequent inquiries made with regard to the management of the Philomathean library the following is offered. The library now contains one hundred and twenty-six volumes, including the most popular of the standard poets, some of the best known works of prose fiction, a few books on science, about twenty books of standard juvenile literature, a few volumes of the miscellaneous writings of such authors as Macaulay, fourteen volumes of biography and eighteen volumes of history. The books are under the control of the society. At the end of every school month the society elects a librarian whose duty it is to open the library Tuesday and Friday of each week when books are taken out and returned. All pupils in the high school and grammar department of the public schools have the privilege of using the books. Since the library was started over one hundred volumes have been drawn every month. The members of the society are anxious to increase the number of books and thus further the usefulness of the library. With this in view they will give a literary entertainment next Saturday evening in Shively's hall and it is hoped that the friends of the society will respond in the same generous way that they have done before. Joint Senator.

The counties of Clackamas and Marion are associated together for the election of a state senator. Mr. Alonzo Gesner of Marion county appears to be the choice of a large number of the delegates from that county for the place named. He is a pioneer, a "true blue" republican, and has enjoyed much experience to qualify him as a lawmaker. Having been raised upon a farm and spent most of his life in that occupation he is the farmers friend. He was county surveyor of Marion county for many years and has been U. S. deputy surveyor and successfully conducted a newspaper, the Statesman, several years in the interve. If Mr. Gesner is selected he will make an able and efficient officer.
