Report of H. S. Gibson, school superintendent, on the annual reports of school districts approved and ordered that warrant be issued in favor of H. S. Gibson for \$145, balance due on reports of 113 school districts.

The county treasurer being unable to procure the proper record books in which to keep separate accounts of the different funds turned over to him in time to make the regular semi-annual report for March 31, 1894, it is ordered that the time for said report be extended to May 1, 1894.
