
IN THE DINING ROOM.

VENTILATION AND ILLUMINATION. ATTRACTIVE TABLEWARE.

Latest Styles In Dining Tables-Principles to Be Observed In Table Desorations. Domestie and Imported China-Lamps Adapted to the Dining Table.

In no portion of the dwelling is the taste of the house mistress so much en evidence as in the dining room. There must be ample space, good ventilation, plenty of light, but no glare; linen spotleas and crystal shining, though neither may be of a fine quality, and china without the suspicion of a nick. Then, with two or three plain dishes well arranged and served, garnished with greenery and flowers, an American housewife can entertain a king.

As for tableware, the names and prices are too numerous to mention. At first class houses can be obtained good, common earthenware sets, stamped with brown, blue and green. While cheap, they are both pretty and durable. For those who prefer imported ware comes the Wedgewood, the Doulton, the Minton and so on up to the hundreds of dollars. For those who choose a nice porcelain, while believing in home manufacture, the Trenton ware amply satis-

fies the most fastidious. It may not be generally known that the famous Beleek ware is almost exactly reproduced in these New Jersey petteries.

For table decorations there are designs without number. A bright woman may easily improvise upon a hundred different schemes. One principle should never be forgotten. If flowers are used, they should not be profusely selected of the sweet scented varieties. With the odors of viands and those of blessoms mingling together there can be but little harmony. Neither should the decorations be made so high that the view is intercepted between parties placed vis-B-VIS. Again, while the dining room should be comfortable, it is a mistake to have it kept too warm. The windows may be slightly opened from the top. yet not enough to create a draft.

One of the latest fashions is that of a triangle shaped dining table made by placing three small tables corner to corner. Over the cavity may be placed a large circular tray, which can be filled with flowers. This arrangement has the merit of novelty and the fact that every one faces the host and hostess, who occupy seats respectively at the point of the triangle and the center of the base,

These shades may be of home manufacture. Either self colored china silk, crimson, gold, pink or white trimmed with lace, or of bolting cloth painted in soft colors, are good, according to Decorator and Furnisher, authority for the foregoing.

Care of the Finger Nalls.

Mr. E. S. Carman, with favorable conditions, would not plant asparagus closer than three by four feet, and it is his belief that in six or eight years a greater distance, say six by three feet, would be seen to be real economy. He says on the subject of setting the sets that he puts his plants only three inches below the surface, and he cannot discover that the shoots are fewer than with the deep setting usually practiced. Mr. Carmen has never perceived that salt was beneficial to asparagas; neither does he think it necessary that the asparagus bed should be stuffed with manure before the plants are set. He says: "To use a large amount of manure in preparing the plot is equivalent to locking up an amount of money where it draws no interest. It is worse lost. As the surplus manure decays and becomes soluble from season to season a considerable portion leaches FRED'K M. SHEFHARD, JOHN L. BLAKE. through the soil and is lost forever to EDWARD H. WRIGHT, the plants."

Varieties of Cotton.

In 1892 the five varieties of cotton giving the highest values per acre at the Mississippi station were: Warren, \$35.72; Jones' Long Staple Prolific, \$82.53; Drake's Cluster, \$82.43; King, \$30.63; Smith's Standard, \$29.51. Of these, only one-Drake's Cluster-ranked among the first five in 1891, and King is the only one which was among the best in 1890.

The five varieties giving the heaviest yield per acre were: Warren, 830 pounds; Drake's Cluster, 809 pounds; pounds. Of these, all except the Jones are very short, and even that is given as 1 5-16 inch. During the last five years the station has tested 68 varieties, and the results show that any variety will vary greatly in different seasons and when planted in different localities, and that it is seldom that any long staple sort is as profitable in the hill regions of the state as are some of the short staple sorts, while in the swamp regions the reverse is usually true.




