Save the best of the ewe lambs resulting and breed them when a year old to a pure bred Dorset sire. The lambs thus produced will be about three-quarters Dorset. Mr. Wing weighed one of these three-quarter lambs when it was 4 months old and it tipped the beam at 80 pounds. He says the Dorset-Merino cross produces "most round-trip rates: 70 remarkable fleeces," and that the Dorset wool itself commands the top market

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
