MEETING OF COUNTY ASSOCIATION.

The Clackamas County Teacher's association met in the new school building at Milwaukie, April 28th and was called to order at 10 o'clock by the president, H. S. Gibson. H. G. Starkweather resigned his position as editor of the teacher's column and Mrs. H. S. Gibson was elected to fill the vacancy for the remainder of the term.

Communications were received inviting the association to meet at several places next month, and Eagle Creek was finally chosen as the next place of meeting.

Miss Edna Ross, Miss Annie Hicinbothen and Prof. T. J. Gray were appointed to prepare a program for next meeting.

The exercises of the day were opened by a song from the pupils of the Milwaukie school.

"History in the Schools" by A. C. Strange was well received by the association. Mr. Strange evidently believed that what is worth doing at all, is worth doing well as his papers read at the associations show careful study and original thought. His address called forth quite a lively discussion, in which many members of the association took part.

A pleasing recitation was rendered by Miss Jess Waldron, followed by a solo from Miss Maggie Williams.

A paper prepared by Miss Hampton, on the subject, "Physiology" was very entertaining, as it contained a great many hints to teachers on this subject. On motion the association adjourned to the town hall where a delicious lunch had been spread, to which the hungry teachers did ample justice.

The afternoon session began at 1:30. G. W. Stricklin was elected to membership in the association.

A vocal duet was rendered by Mrs. Ohlsen and Miss Ida Starkweather.

Prof. T. J. Gary gave a class drill in reading which was much appreciated.

"Object of the Teachers' Association," a talk given by Prof. R. W. Pringle was attentively listened to by the audience.

Prof. Pringle believes that by coming together at such associations and exchanging ideas we get better methods. He believes in combining theory and practice, and thinks that every one intending to make teaching a profession should attend the county association. He dwelt upon the duty of response when work is given, and also the manner in which work is done.

Mrs. Ohlsen next favored the audience with a recitation.

The subject of "Recreation" was handled by Prof. W. H. Powell in an able manner. He had brought a class of twenty girls from Oregon City, who illustrated his work in callisthenics.

Ortography was the subject assigned to Miss Edna Ross.

She believing in combining written and oral spelling. A discussion followed in which Prof. S. U. Downs, A. C. Strange and Miss Hampton took part.

A select reading was then given by Wm. Hankins.

Several friends and patrons of the Milwaukie and Harmony schools spoke kind words of encouragement to the association.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we, the members of the Clackamas County Teachers' Association extend our hearty thanks to the good people of Milwaukie for the royal entertainment furnished this day. Also to the teachers of the Milwaukie school for the many courtesies shown.

Running No. 6—2-year-old stake, 1 mile, \$250 added; entrance 60, 1st payment, \$10 with nomination June 1st, 2d payment, \$15, August 1st, 3d payment, \$25, 6 p. m. night preceding race—winner of one race this year to carry 3 pounds; of two or more 5 pounds penalty. Maidens allowed 10 pounds.

THIRD DAY—WEDNESDAY, SEPT. 19.

Trotting No. 7—2:40 class, best 3 in 5; purse \$250.

Running No. 8—Owners handicap; 1 mile dash; purse \$300.

Running No. 9—Eleventh-sixteenth of a mile dash; horses entered to be sold for \$2,000 to carry entitled weights. If for less than one pound allowed each \$100 less to \$1,500, then two pounds allowed each \$100 less to \$500, then 3 pounds allowed each \$100 less to \$300.
