POLK PREPARING TO RATIFY.

DALLAS, June 5.—The election returns of the twenty precincts of Polk county have not been counted. There were 2800 votes cast, and so far as counted they indicate a grand republican majority. Ira S. Smith and D. L. Keyt, republicans, are elected by 400 plurality. The district republican ticket is elected by about the same vote. The entire republican ticket, from clerk to coroner, is elected by large majorities. This is

the first time in six years that Polk county has elected republican representatives. A grand ratification will be held in Dallas tomorrow evening.

TILLAMOOK TAKES A HAND.

TILLAMOOK, June 5.—The vote in nine precincts out of the eighteen was: For governor—Lord 346, Galloway 176, Kennedy 30, Pierce 215. For congress—Hermann 390, Miller 181, Weatherford 162.

Thirteen precincts out of 17 give for joint representatives, Yamhill and Tillamook, Dyer, pop, 211; Guild, rep. 346; Selp, dem., 280. Private dispatches from Yamhill indicate Guild's election by 500 majority. The remaining precincts will hold much the same proportion. The county ticket was badly scratched. The county populists elect a woman for school superintendent, and come close on other county officers. The democrats elect the judge and clerk.

MEDFORD VOTES STRAIGHT.

MEDFORD, June 5.—Election yesterday passed off quietly, and this morning the result was a surprise to all. The populist who had been the victors, were overcome with joy. The official canvass of the two Medford precincts was completed at a late hour this morning, and showed great populist gains, but they gave Lord 173 majority over Galloway and 153 over Pierce.

AT HERMANN'S HOME.

ROSEBERG, June 5.—A careful estimate of the vote in Douglas county places the pluralities of the candidates on the republican state ticket from 250 to 500.

OLD LINN REPUBLICAN.

ALBANY, June 5.—Complete returns from Linn county, except one precinct, give Lord 1847, Galloway 1994, Pierce 1491. All republicans on the state, district and legislative ticket have pluralities about the same. Wolvorton for supreme judge, has 1862, Loise 1223, and Bennett 1149. Every republican on the county ticket is elected.

LAKE SPEAKS PLAIN.

EGGENE, June 5.—Returns from 26 out of 39 precincts in this county are now in, and show the largest republican pluralities ever known here. Every man on the republican ticket has been elected beyond the shadow of a doubt. The pluralities will range from 300 to 700. The republican state ticket will have large pluralities. The best judges estimate that Lord and Kincaid have 800 plurality each, and Leads a little less. Hermann has about 750, and Irwin will have about 200 more than Reid. The senator and three representatives are all republican. The populists probably cast 1100 votes all told.

MULTNOMAH IS SLOW.

PORTLAND, June 7.—At midnight the total vote of all but 12 of the 77 precincts had been received. It was 14,357, and the precincts yet to hear from will bring it close to 16,000. Fifty-nine complete and eight incomplete precincts gave Minto 5303 and Sears 6108 votes, a majority for the latter of 805, which the returns from the twelve precincts yet to hear from will hardly reduce. For mayor, the complete vote of 46 precincts and incomplete vote of 7 precincts gave Frank 5975 and Inman 5281, a majority of 694 for Frank. There were but five precincts unheard from. For state senator complete returns from 58 precincts and the unfinished count of seven precincts gave Simon 5752 and Thayer 4829, a majority for Simon of 923. Fifteen precincts had not been heard from on the state senatorship. For district attorney, 53 complete precincts and 8 incomplete precincts gave Hume 6657, and Muir 6407; Hume's majority 250. It will hardly be overcome by the 18 unheard-from precincts. Complete returns from 37 precincts give the following result of the vote for circuit judge: Stephens 3924, Munly 3355; Stephens' majority, 569. At 2 o'clock this morning the 34th, 39th and 47th precincts had completed their count. They swelled Simon's total majority to 937, Sears' to 972, and Hume's to 350, and reduced Frank's lead to 671. They are all East Side precincts. Complete returns from 45 precincts gave the following vote for circuit judge: Munly 4253, Stephens 5136; Stephens' majority, 883. The vote of the same precincts for representatives was: Republicans—Beach 4500, Burke 4271, Cardwell 4262, Cole 4469, Long 4328, McCracken 4537, Myers 4352, Paxton 4115, Thompson 3664. Populists—Jacobson 791, Rogers 688. Demo-populists—Evans 2940, Carroll 3177, Hufford 2199, Kemp 2835, Miller 3145, O'Day 3025, Quinn 2946, Smith 2790, Stangeland 2545. Independent republicans—Wheeler 1180, Pope 883.

FIRST COMPLETE REPUBLICAN.

McMINNVILLE, June 6.—The entire republican county ticket is elected for the first time in the history of the county. Only one democratic justice of the peace and one populist constable are elected in the county, and they only by fusion. Several republicans voted for Galloway, but more democrats voted for Pierce.

Rand, rep., is elected prosecuting attorney in the sixth district. A straight republican set of officers from state senator to coroner is chosen, except superintendent of schools. Miss Woodruff, pop., is re-elected to that position. Price, for state senator, Gardane, Davis and Shtrum are elected to the legislature.

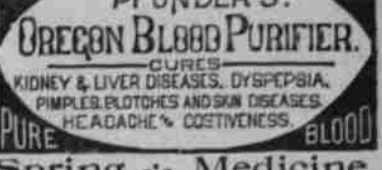
