The provisions of the law as applied to this county are as follows: "County clerk \$1,800 per annum; recorder of conveyances, \$1,500 per annum, sheriff \$2.000 per annum. Each of these offices may be supplied with a deputy to be paid in full or in part by the county as the court may direct, providing they deem the services of a deputy necessary. Fees for filing and serving papers will be charged as heretofore, but instead of going into the pocket of the officer they must be paid to the county treasurer the same day they are received.
