PROGRAM FOR THE FOURTH.

An Outline of the Work for the Natal Day in Oregon City.

At break of day the boom of the cannon is expected to wake all the citizens of the city and surrounding country as it peals forth the National salute.

Promptly at 10 o'clock the procession will form, the following being the order, arrangement and line of march designated by Grand Marshal H. E. Smith:

The procession will form on Main street south of Fourth with the right resting on Fourth street. The order will be, Oregon City band followed by company F acting as an escort, followed by the liberty car, officers of the day, speakers and invited guests in carriages. Societies and other participants will form in the following order: G. A. R. on West Fourth street with front resting on Main. A. O. U. W. and U. R. K. of P. on East Fourth street with front on Main. Fire Department led by Park Place band on West Fifth street with front on Main. The Brownies will accompany this section.

Woodmen of the World on east Fifth street with front resting on Main. Boys' Brigade, three companies, led by drum corps on east Sixth street with front resting on Main. Other societies whose acceptances have not yet been received by the committee will form on west Sixth street together with all citizens and others who are cordially invited to join in making the parade a special feature of the day's attractions.

The line of march will be down Main street to Moss, then countermarch to First and back to the grove on Tenth street. Special attractions of the parade will be the liberty car with the representation of states and territories, the Goddess of Liberty and the Graces, Justice, Wisdom, Fortitude and Plenty. In conjunction with the Brownies, Uncle Sam will appear appropriately dressed to oversee pigmy people. Other special attractions which we are not permitted to announce will appear. The procession will be in charge of Grand Marshal H. E. Smith assisted by Aids G. A. Harding, J. U. Campbell and J. P. Shaw.

At the grove the exercises will commence at 11 o'clock and will consist of singing of patriotic airs by a full chorus, singing by the Brownies, an oration by Hon. C. W. Fulton, of Astoria, reading of the Declaration of Independence by Miss Bessie Evans of Oswego, and other exercises.

Immediately following the parade and before the exercises at the grove Company F will give an exhibition drill which promises to be an attractive feature of the day's program. This will be followed by a prize drill by the several companies of the Boys' Brigade.

After the grove exercises at the corner of Tenth and Water streets time will be given for a picnic dinner after which the contests and races the full program for which is published elsewhere and which has been spread broadcast upon the small bills will be presented, and it is confidently believed that it furnishes so much and so great a variety that all can be suited. Full programs of the races and contests will be found upon the ground the morning of the Fourth when an official program will be distributed.

For the convenience of visitors the general committee has determined to provide ice water in convenient localities and to provide a place where wraps and lunch baskets can be checked and kept safe.

As the committee has not heard from all of the societies which had been invited to participate in the parade it was impossible to assign all who may be intending to participate to positions but they can report to the Grand Marshal on the morning of the Fourth and they will be assigned to positions in the line of march.
