THE COUNTY COURT.

REGULAR AND ADJOURNED SESSION OF COUNTY FATHERS.

First Term of New Court—Important Business Transacted—Some Big Bills.

ADJOURNED TERM.

Certain warrants remaining unpaid ordered advertised.

Clerk directed to issue warrant for \$7.50 in favor of W. H. Burghardt, on indigent soldier fund, to defray expense of sending John Gurbredt to soldier's home. Clerk also instructed to issue a warrant on same fund for \$4,500 in favor of same to defray funeral expense of Con Imel, an indigent soldier.

Claim of Hamshaw & Behm for \$110 for improvement of Abernethy road allowed.

Report of Judge J. W. Meltrun relative to minor expenditures approved and clerk ordered to draw a warrant for \$23.87 to reimburse him.

Claim of D. Lyons for widening and improving county road at head of Fifth street allowed to the amount of \$20.

Bill of Enos Cahill for lumber for improvement of Apperson road allowed.

Clerk ordered to issue a warrant for the collection of delinquent taxes for the year 1887, 1888, 1889, 1890, 1891 and 1892.

Warrants ordered issued in favor of J. E. Rhodes for \$190 for completing township plats and clerk ordered to have the same bound.

Rebate of \$3 allowed Thos. Pollock on taxes.

Claim of Western Wheel & Scraper Co. for \$275 allowed.

Clerk directed to issue warrant in favor of Ben C. Irwin for \$63.27 in full for all records furnished to date.

Mileage and per diem allowed as follows: C. Bair, 3 days, 28 miles, 11.80; R. Scott, 4 days, 18 miles, including one day extra \$13.80.

REGULAR JULY TERM.

Report of viewers on resurvey of Smith road filed, approved and ordered open on line of survey. Expense account of \$28.90 allowed.

Report of appraisers of damages on Foster and Milwaukee road laid over till August term. Expense account of \$9.20 ordered paid.

Report of appraisers of damages on John Johnson road approved and upon payment of damages by petitioners the road shall be opened. Expense of \$11 allowed.

Petition of H. H. Johnson et al for county road allowed and J. T. Apperson, J. W. Roots and John Wetzlar, jr., appointed viewers to meet at place of beginning, Thursday, July 19 at 10 a. m.

Petition of Wm. Dreschel for viewers to change county road laid over till the August term.

Application of J. T. Apperson and Thos. Charman to be released from bond of E. C. Maddock granted and new bond approved. New bond of M. L. Moore also approved.

Tax rebate of \$3.26 ordered in favor of B. Wade.

Appropriation of \$67 made for improvement of the George road as per application of J. F. Rath et al.

Report of C. T. Howard upon the improve of the Howard road approved and expense account of \$150 allowed.

Allowance for care of Mrs. Morgan increased to \$10 per month.

Appointment of H. S. Strange as deputy clerk approved and salary fixed at \$65 per month to be paid at the close of each month without further action.

Appointment of N. M. Moody as deputy sheriff approved and salary fixed at \$65 per month paid as above.

Appointment of J. M. Lawrence as deputy recorder approved and salary fixed at \$52 per month to be paid as above.

Clerk directed to advertise for advertising 50 cords of large live fir timber to be delivered at court house by September 15th, 1904. Bids to be opened August 9th at 2 p. m.

Application of D. H. Tuttle et al for county road approved and D. W. Kinnaid appointed surveyor with H. H. Gregory, Robt. Hughes and J. J. McCord as viewers to meet at place of beginning July 17 at 10 a. m.

Proposition for the improvement of the Bradley & Richey road referred to Supervisor A. W. Cooke to investigate and report at August term of court.

Petition of F. A. Meinig for license to sell liquor in Cascade precinct in quantities less than one quart granted.

Report of W. H. Smith, supervisor of road district No. 2 showing expenditures of \$1256.45 for labor, \$240.82 for material and \$69 for supervision; total \$1566.27 approved.

Report of supervisor upon completion of bridge in Canemah precinct on Lawton road approved and expense account ordered paid as follows: Labor \$134.74; material \$31.10.

Expense account for improvement of Oregon City and Viola road amounting to \$85 ordered paid.

Expense account of \$201.10 for improvement of Oregon City and Baker's Ferry road ordered paid.

Trial fee of \$12 in case of Portland Trust Co. vs Reuben Smith ordered refunded, as the circuit court held the suit a "mis-trial."

Report of W. H. Smith upon the mat-

ter complained of by G. J. Trullinger relative to Mulino and Meadow Brook road improved, referred to Commissioner Frank Jagger to report at August term.

Protest of Judge Hayes against the payment of the bill for \$105.55 in the case of the State vs E. S. Bramhall entered. The judge held that there was no ground for this prosecution except malice upon the part of complaining witness who should have been held for costs as he has property.

Report of E. P. Carter, supervisor of road district No. 3 showing expenditures of \$331.52 for labor; \$163.75 for material and \$48 for supervision approved.

Report of G. W. Prosser, supervisor of road district No. 4 showing expenditures of \$330.20 for labor; \$41.92 for material and \$28 for supervision, approved. Ordered that the supervisor rebuild certain bridges on the Oregon City and Stafford road and certify the expense to this court. Expense of \$150 incurred by Superintendent Prosser in repair of Oregon City and Stafford road appraised and ordered paid.

Road supervisors instructed to cause the immediate removal of all fences and other obstructions in the public high-ways in Clackamas county.

Warrant for \$50 ordered issued in favor of Judge Gordon E. Hayes to be used for small contingent expenses of county offices.

Report of A. W. Cooke, supervisor of road district No. 1 showing expenditures of \$533.50 for labor, \$532.12 for material, \$31.65 for bridge work and \$75 for supervision approved.

Supervisor Cooke instructed to procure the necessary material and rebuild the bridge on Milwaukee and Foster road across Rock Creek.

Expense account of \$37.10 incurred in improving the Winston and Union school house road allowed. Expense account of \$235.55 for improvement of Milwaukee and Foster road ordered paid.

Clerk instructed to draw a warrant in favor of Thos. Brown for \$50, it being one-half of the cost of improving the Baker Bridge and Faralida Mill road, the other half having been donated by Mr. Brown.

Salaries of county officials ordered paid, warrant to issued at the close of each month without further action by this court.

Relative to the complaint of H. W. Ross that obstructions exist in the road east of Fetthelmer's Ferry, Supervisor Cooke having reported that such was not the case, the complaint was dismissed.

The sum of \$16 per month appropriated for the care of J. Bronaghan, a pauper and Judge Hayes directed to make permanent arrangements for his care.

County clerk directed to advertise for a county physician to attend all paupers and to furnish the necessary medicine. Bids to be opened Aug. 9 at 3 p. m.

Petition of N. Pavn et al for improvement of county road from Sandy to Pleasant Home denied, as petitioners had not complied with general rule of court to subscribe a sum equal to the amount asked of the county.

License granted T. J. McFarland to sell liquor in less quantities than one quart in Oswego precinct.

Walter A. Robinson appointed constable for district No. 3.

Annual reports of county officers approved and placed on file.

Ordered that the sum of \$200 be transferred from the general fund of the county to the indigent soldier fund.

Supervisor Carter authorized to expend the sum of \$25 on the county road from E. P. Carter's place to Soda Spring.

Mileage and per diem allowed as follows: R. Scott, 4 days, 22 miles; \$14.20; Frank Jagger, 4 days, 12 miles; \$13.20.
