A Slight Conflagration—Neighborhood Notes—A Runaway.

CARUS, July 9.—There was a general turning out of people from this vicinity to enjoy the celebration of the glorious Fourth at Oregon City. Everybody had a splendid time in one way or another.

Sunday noon, while sitting at dinner, the family of A. O. Hayward was startled by the news that the house was burning. A gentleman riding by saw the flames break through on the roof. His timely warning and assistance, and the lively efforts of Mr. Hayward, his son, and three or four others who came to their aid, saved the building. The damage was light, one chamber, roof, bed, bedding and furniture being destroyed. The fire originated from the burning of some fringed hats that had been put in the fireplace for the summer. After lighting them the roof was watched for fear of fire, but it was an hour later before the fire broke out.

How to Make a Pretty Table Cover.

A pretty table cover is made of a French pearl gray broadcloth of good quality. Draw in each corner a somewhat elaborate pattern of flowers and leaves, having it so that it may be cut out easily. Buttonhole the pattern all around with heavy white silk; then carefully cut the inside out, leaving the pattern in open work. Have a square of rose pink satin or silk, and place it under the square of broadcloth. The edges may be sewed together and trimmed with a handsome fancy lace or fringe, or the edge of the broadcloth may be pinked and a band of rose-colored broadcloth be made just wide enough to come below the pearl gray a half inch and be stitched to the silk lining by two rows of stitching, which will effectively conceal the raw edges. The lining will need to be held in place, in this case, by tassels upon the corners or butterfly bows placed at intervals along the edge.

How to Revive Drooping Cut Flowers.

To their stems closely together, cover their tops with paper to exclude the air and plunge the flowers into a deep pitcher or jar of water nearly up to their tops. Put in an ice box or the coolest place to be found. Blossoms may thus be kept a long time.

How to Stew Parsnips.

Take six good sized parsnips, a teaspoonful of salt, wash and scrape the parsnips, cut them in halves; throw them in cold water for a half hour. Put them in a saucepan, cover with boiling water, add the salt and boil for one hour. Take them up on a hot dish and pour over them the following sauce: Put a tablespoonful of butter in a frying pan with a tablespoonful of flour, mix until smooth; add a half pint of the water in which the parsnips were boiled. Stir and boil for five minutes, add salt and pepper and serve.

How to Wring Out Hot Wet Flannels.

Put them inside a towel and hold the ends in the hand while wringing. A square bag with a stick run through each end and an opening in the middle of one side is better. Drop the dripping cloth into the bag, then use the stick to turn it by.

How to Care for a Refrigerator.

Place your refrigerator in a cool spot, but one having light and air. Once a week remove everything from it, and take out all shelves or movable parts. Wash these well in hot soapuds, rinse freely in boiling water. Put them in the sun or before the range to dry. Wash in the same way the rack on which the ice sets, but use greater care, as this is generally corrugated or grooved, and secretions of dirt may be overlooked. Wash the inside of the entire refrigerator with suds and boiling water, being careful to wipe all perfectly dry. Use a flexible wire for running down the tube where the refuse water runs off. Dissolve two tablespoonfuls of washing soda in a quart of boiling water on the stove. After it boils pour it into the ice compartment, follow it quickly with a kettle full of boiling water and wipe dry. Leave the refrigerator open for an hour and then put back your ice and food. The best day in the week for this work is when the ice man is expected. Attend to it immediately after breakfast. Never put warm food in a refrigerator, as it will absorb the flavors of other food, and also heat the refrigerator.

How to Make Paint Shine Without Varnish.

Paint mixed with a liquid composed of one gallon of linseed oil, two ounces each of burnt umber and black lead, and a quarter of a pound of litharge, boiled together, will dry quickly, with a hard finish and a glosslike varnish.

How to Care for a Bathroom.

If you cannot keep your bathroom sweet by thorough flushing every day and by pouring hot soda water or dissolved coppers through the pipes about once a week, there must be some serious trouble with the plumbing, and you should have it examined at once. Sometimes the pipe in the kitchen sink is not kept perfectly free and sweet, or the closet in the basement is not properly flushed. Try having the pipe in the kitchen sink flushed twice a week with strong soda water. It should be boiling hot. It will dissolve and carry off all the particles of grease that may be clinging to the pipe.
