Beware of Fire.

The governor has issued the following proclamation :

"In accordance with the provisions of an act of the legislative assembly of the no profane hand might pluck its sweets. state of Oregon, passed at its seventeenth regular session, entitled 'An act to protect timber and other property from fire,' I do hereby make proclamation calling the attention of the people of the state to its provisions and warning all persons against violating the same.

By the provisions of the act alluded to by the governor, if any person "shall maliciously with intent to kinlde a fire by which the property of others shall be destroyed, he is subject to a fine of from \$20 to \$1,000, or imprisonment in the county jail from three to twelve months; or if any person without malice kindle any fire in a field not his own without the consent of the owners, by which property is destroyed, he is subjected to fine and imprisonment; or if any person shall willfully set fire to any forest belonging to the state or United States he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be subject to fine and imprisonment.
