COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.

Business Transacted at the Regular October Term—Bills Allowed.

Gordon E. Hayes, Judge. B. Scott and Frank Jagger, Commissioners. At the regular term of county court, held in this city last week, the following business was transacted:

In the matter of the report of viewers of damages on the Abner road, report of viewers awarding W. R. O'Neill \$150 damages approved, and the road ordered opened on the payment of same by the petitioners.

In the matter of the resignation of F. M. Kruse, justice of the peace of dist. No. 1, accepted and Wilson McConnell appointed to fill vacancy.

Matter of claim of Geo. E. Dye for damages to his land by the improvement of a county road, ordered that J. W. Root, R. S. McLaughlin and J. R. Morton be appointed to view and appraise the damages to said land and improve to meet at 10 A. M. on October 19, on premises of said Geo. E. Dye.

Petition of Wm. Mezingo et al for viewers for a county road granted and A. V. Davis, S. Cooke and A. J. Sawtell appointed viewers and D. W. Kinnaird, county surveyor to survey said road to meet at place of beginning on Oct. 18 at 10 A. M.

Application of I. S. Miller for a bridge on Rock creek on I. S. Miller road denied.

Petition of Ed Dupies for license to sell malt liquor in Oswego precinct for the period of six months, granted.

Matter of petition of Henry Wilbern et al for a change in the Foster and Milwaukee road ordered that Henry Dubois, A. Luelling and C. W. Noblitt be appointed to view and D. W. Kinnaird, county surveyor, to survey said road, to meet at place of beginning at 10 A. M. on Oct. 23rd.

Report of Supervisor A. W. Cooke on the improvement of the Bradley and Epperson road approved and expense account of \$82.90 ordered paid.

Report of W. H. Smith, supervisor of road dist. No. 2 for September, approved and expense account ordered paid as follows: Material, \$45.30; labor, county fund, \$28.50; labor, road fund, \$22.62.

Application of I. Ackerman to redeem a part of property in Holmes addition, assessed to him and sold at tax sale for taxes of 1892, denied.

Matter of care and keeping of John Jones ordered that H. W. Perry be allowed the sum of \$8 per month commencing with Sept. 1st.

Report of R. Scott, commissioner, on the work done in making fills at ends of Johnson creek bridge approved.

Report of county officers on collection of fees during the month of September approved. Fees received as follows: Sheriff, \$52.55; recorder, \$163.55; clerk, \$135.10.

Report of J. L. Swafford on the improvement of the Oregon City and Cuttings Mill road approved and ordered that expense account of \$237.57 be paid.

Matter of care and keeping of Mr. Wallace, T. J. Bonahoyson and Z. S. Dodson, county charges, ordered that warrant for \$8 per month be issued on the first day of each month in favor of—Hart for said purpose to date from September 1st.

Matter of care and keeping of John Tuttle, pauper; ordered that \$10 per month be allowed for said pauper, warrants for same to be drawn in favor of D. H. Tuttle on first day of each month.

Proposition of B. F. Linn to improve Oregon City and Highland road laid over to February term 1895.

Application of L. D. Leonard for rebate of poll tax for 1893 he being a non-resident of Clackamas county granted and ordered that clerk issue warrant for \$3 in favor of said Leonard.

Report of G. W. Prosser, supervisor of road dist. No. 4 for September approved and expense account paid as follows to wit: Labor and supervision \$23.50, material \$9.84.

Application of M. A. Stratton for tax rebate.
