SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 7.—An evening paper states that weevils are playing havoc with the stored wheat in this port, and, if something is not done soon, there will be no grain left with which to load the disengaged ships now in port. Some days ago it was publically stated that 6700 tons of wheat at Port Costa was weevilly, and now it is announced that 11,100 tons at the Nevada dock and 4400 tons more at Port Costa are infected and will have to be removed. That makes 22,200 tons unfit for shipment, and will have to be used for pig or chicken feed. If the wheat had been shipped at the low rates of freight in existence a few months ago a small profit might have been made. Now it will be almost a total loss.
