FOR A GRAND REUNION.—Delegates met in Portland last Sunday from the various G. A. R. posts, S. V.'s and Ladies Aid Societies in Clackamas and Multnomah counties for the purpose of taking steps toward holding a grand reunion at some central point next summer of all these organizations in the two counties.

DEATH OF AN OREGON PIONEER.—Frank Dekum, one of the pioneers of Oregon and a resident of Portland since 1853, died in that city last Friday of Bright's disease.

FOR A NEW SCHOOL DISTRICT.—A movement is under way to divide the West Side school district and make it into two districts. The proposed dividing line is to commence at the west end of the suspension bridge running west so as to take in the Willamette Falls depot and then to follow the top of the bluff on a line mid-way between Sunset, Windsor, Willamette and Falls.

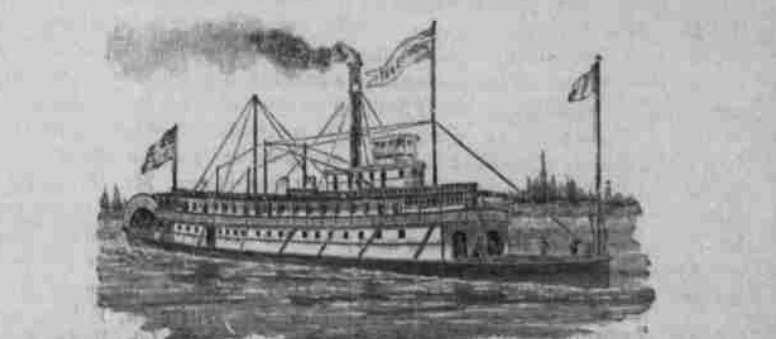
