In addi-6000 tion to the regular contributions the 2010 reading room has received several sub-6255 stantial donations during the year in 9245 books, magazines, furniture and fuel 2700 which were greatly appreciated. The 2540 rooms are now fairly well furnished and 5800 present an attractive appearance. The 4780 attendance has been much larger during 2130 the past year than was anticipated 1,400 and shows how well the institution 3750 is appreciated by the public. Much 6,330 of the credit for the success of the 2800 reading room is due to Rev. Wall, the 2715 librarian, who has been untiving in his 3300 efforts to carry out the work of the as-2295 sociation. 
