HABITS OF STUDY.

The following excellent article is from the educational column of the Vancouver Columbian, and is well worth perusing by parents and pupils as well as by teachers.

There are many men and women in the world who owe their success to habits of study formed in early life. The importance of habit formation can scarcely be exaggerated. All acknowledge the power of habit, the advantage of good habits and the evil of bad ones. Perhaps no habit is so prolific of good or so desirable as the habit of study. Those who have fortunately formed that habit are constantly turning leisure moments to practical utility. They are constantly progressing and their services are generally in demand.

There never was a time in the history of the world when there were too many competent, reliable men and women to conduct the world's affairs. Were some one to advertise for a man to do common labor there would be numerous applications. If the engagement was to be a permanent and lucrative one, the employer would select with care one of good, steady habits. If the employment required a person of education, there would be a still closer scrutiny. Elimination on the score of habits would be as exacting as that on the question of education. Almost every call now made for boys adds that no cigarette smokers need apply.

The habits of youth must be considered negatively as well as positively. Certain habits of profanity and vulgarity are as objectionable as that of smoking or chewing tobacco. These constitute the negative side of our habits and must be carefully repressed. On the other hand, the habits of study and industry are to be cultivated constantly. Studious habits supply a pleasing occupation at all seasons. They constantly improve and develop the mind. They enhance every other good quality and improve every natural gift. A person of studious habits avoids numerous occasions of evil and temptation to which the thoughtless and unoccupied are frequently exposed.

Teachers must instill into the minds of pupils a great esteem for the habit of study. Study, not only at school, during school term, or during the long winter evening, but at all seasons. A special time for study ought to be found each day or week at least. Besides this, there should be a special line of study to which leisure moments may be devoted. The teacher ought to convince the pupils that the school work is but preparatory. The average school education can do no more than lay the foundation for the future foundation for the future structure. It is in this structure that the habit of study will be of great value. A course of study simply means a certain amount of work done creditably. Those who have done this work will have a nucleus and stimulus for constant self improvement and enjoyment in the future. Without this habit of study, the fund acquired in school often shrivels and dries from lack of exercise and the subject drifts aimlessly down the stream of life. If we wish to be of permanent benefit to our pupils, let us aim to impart to them a love of study with an esteem for the good and true.
