ROAD LOGIC.

CARLISLE'S MONEY.

As was to be expected the bankers have forced Carlisle to amend his wild-cat currency scheme to more fully conform to their ideas. His plan was that when a bank failed an unlimited assessment was to be made on all the banks to redeem the outstanding notes of the bank.

There is little doubt that in a large part of Nebraska much actual want and suffering is now experienced by the hapless people of that drought-stricken state. We of Oregon, where crops never fail, know nothing of the horrors of famine such as these destitute people are now undergoing.

The Newburg Independent comes out in favor of precinct assessors and wants the office of county assessor abolished. While there are some good features in the system of precinct assessors yet it lacks the system and thoroughness of an assessment made under the direction of one man.

Tax Oriental war is dragging slowly along. As fast as the Japanese can find anybody to fight they win a victory. The Chinese have lost their courage and their armies are

ing for peace. As to what terms Japan will grant is not known. They have intimated though that it will take a heavy money indemnity and a large slice of territory to bring on peace.

Another market is about to be opened up to Oregon lumber. Recently a trial shipment of Port Orford cedar was made to A. W. Faber, the great German pencil maker, and reports come back that the wood was satisfactory.

As a result of the agitation by the Enterprise the good roads movement is rapidly gaining strength in Clackamas county, and the mossback and opposition element is becoming so weak that the county court will have but little to contend against in pushing the road work in this county.

The merchants of Oregon City have had a holiday trade far in excess of their expectations. All report their sales much larger than for the same season last year.

SPIRIT OF THE PRESS.

THE ROAD QUESTION AGAIN.

Junius Offers His Last Word and Argues Against Plank Roads.

To THE EDITOR: During a residence of eight years or more in Oregon I had not learned that our state constitution precludes the issuing of bonds in the way I indicated last week. My thanks are due the Enterprise for letting me down so gently.

As between plank roads and macadam I must still adhere to the latter style as being preferable, provided always it is a genuine macadam. I would like to add a few words to strengthen if possible what I said last week.

Too much cannot be said against the great destruction and waste of timber that is going on in Oregon. Thousands—yes, millions—of wealth is being burned on the ground annually, or converted to uses of no lasting value. The day is coming when instead of getting our fuel for \$2.00 per cord we shall be glad to get it for \$4.00, and for our building lumber we may reasonably expect the price will be very greatly increased.

Some forty years ago or more, plank roads became all the rage in Northeastern Ohio. The writer was a resident there at that time and knows whereof he speaks. These roads were built extensively all over the eleven counties of what used to be called the "Western Reserve."

Human nature asserted itself there as elsewhere. If a road was built in any town or harbor on the lake, or to any county town further southward, a rival town must have a like road or the devil was to pay in a flat currency of jealousy and hot wrath. So it was that the roads were built. In less than ten years they were completely worn out, with no timber at hand to renew them.

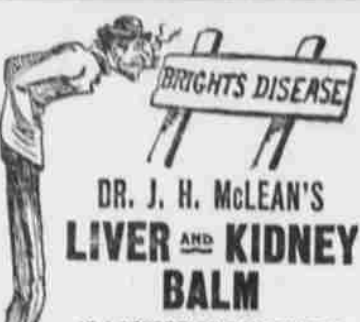
The people of Northern Ohio gave away immense wealth for a temporary and doubtful benefit. Add to this the fact that the numerous farmers who lived in log houses at that day, when they got ready to build more substantial dwellings had the privilege of paying from twelve to twenty dollars per thousand for their lumber, shipped in mostly by way of the lake from Michigan, Wisconsin and Canada.

Do not the above facts illustrate somewhat the condition we shall be in here if we go into a general system of plank road building? True, our forests are so extensive that it would take many years to reduce the scarcity of lumber to a scale as low as that in Ohio. But just so far as our forests are cut away for plank road purposes just so far is Oregon's wealth wasted.

I have no personal interest in this matter further than a strong desire for the prosperity and happiness of the community at large. No property to bequeath—no children here to enjoy Oregon's great and manifold blessings—no horse to ride or drive over good or bad roads.
