During the past six months there has been but 18 feet of 6-inch cast-iron pipe purchased and laid, together with the former pipe that the old board had purchased but not laid, constituted the main disbursements under labor charge.

Two blocks of lap-welded pipe was taken up between Fifth and Seventh streets on Centre, and re-laid on Taylor street, six-inch cast pipe being laid on Centre to replace the lap-welded pipe.

There remains on hand 300 feet of 4-inch, 60 feet of 6-inch, 24 feet of 8-inch and 36 feet of 10-inch cast-iron pipe.

An extra leather belt of the best quality was purchased and is kept on hand in case the present belt should break.

A new set of cut-gears was placed on the old pump and as they are of greater breadth thereby lessening the strain on them, it places the pump in first-class condition to run on a moment's notice in case the new pump should have to be shut down.

The station has been repainted and everything is in first-class working condition.

School Book Vote.

The canvass of the vote of the several county school superintendents by the state board of education, consisting of Governor Penoyer, Secretary of State McBride and Superintendent McElroy, for a series of textbooks to be used in the public schools of Oregon for a period of six years, under the law, exhibits the following results:

First—No textbook has received a majority of the votes cast under the following topics: Orthography, spelling blanks, drawing, physical geography, rhetoric and composition and English literature.

Second—There has been no change in the following text books that are now in use, and they have been readopted for use in all the public schools of the state, to-wit: Swinton's new word analysis; Barnes' new national readers; spencerian

system and copybooks; Fish's arithmetic; No. 1 and 2; Brook's mental arithmetic; Monteth's elementary and comprehensive geographies; Smith's series of primary textbooks in physiology and hygiene; Steele's physiology and hygiene for high school and advanced schools; Barnes' primary and brief history of the United States; Loomis' series of vocal music; Barnes' general history; Monteith's popular science; Robinson's algebra and geometry; Bryant & Stratton's system of book-keeping; Steele's chemistry, botany physics, astronomy and geology.

Third—The textbooks that have been changed are as follows: Maxwell's first book in language, introduction to English grammar and advanced English grammar have been adopted instead of Barnes' language lessons; Still's English grammar and Clark's normal grammar; Peterman's civil government, Oregon edition, has been adopted instead of Young's classbook.

Fourth—The additional books adopted that may be used in all grades in the public schools are as follows: National number tablets, Song Wave, Gowa's morals and manners, Kidd's elementary and vocal culture, Johnnet's national history and historical series of text books for supplementary reading for primary and intermediate schools. For advanced schools and high schools the following: Geographical reader, Irving's Sketch Book, Irving's Tale of a Traveler, Scott's Abbott, Scott's Marmion, Scott's Ivanhoe, Scott's Lady of the Lake, Scott's Woodstock, McCaulav's Essay on Chatham, Shakespeare's Julius Caesar, Twelfth Night, Merchant of Venice, and Midsummers Night's Dream Webster's Bunker Hill Oration, Deconvry's Papers, Arnold's Sobab and Rostum. Most of these books are published by the American Book Company.

ROAD AGITATION CONTAGIOUS.

To the Editor: Judging from the number of your correspondents in regard to road matter I believe the thing is becoming contagious, and I feel a little of the views working on me and would be glad of a small piece in your valuable paper to air my views. It appears that nearly all of our road men are opposed to plank roads. I believe in plank roads partly perhaps for the sake of opposition. But let us come down to fact and figures, which if honestly manipulated will not lie.

In the first place all roads should be properly graded, ditched on both sides and say twenty-four feet wide on top. Plank can be had for something less than six dollars per thousand at the mill. They should be sawed eight feet long, eight inches wide and four inches thick, laid on one and one-half by six inch boards, and laid so the dirt on both ends will be a little more than flush with the top of the plank. Such a road with heavy teaming will last from eight to ten years with very little repairing.

The people in the vicinity will be glad to haul plank from mill grates. The laying of plank would cost but little, making the actual cost of road, after grading, about \$1000 per mile. A good stone road cannot be built for less than double that amount, notwithstanding one of your last weeks correspondents says that they can be built from \$400 to \$600 per mile. Better let him have the job. Now the interest on the extra expense of stone road will keep the plank road in repair for at least twenty-five years, or until the timber plays out.

The plank should be laid on the right hand side going to town, and a good dirt road on the other side, which, with constant packing down in dry weather with wide tire wagons, and a little repairing, would by the time the plank road is gone make a splendid road. And to clinch the matter we have a road one can travel without using any profanity, which I don't believe any one can do (unless it be a preacher or deacon) on any stone road we have so far made. C.
