Road Engineer Assumes His Duties.

The first of this month D. W. Kinnaird assumed the duties of road engineer in addition to that of county surveyor. It is Mr. Kinnaird's intention to at once make a thorough inspection of all the roads in the county as to the grades and condition with a view of ascertaining what repairs are necessary and to decide as to what thoroughfares should be improved first. In carrying on the road work Mr. Kinnaird will recommend to the county court that all large jobs be let by contract, provided the bids come within his estimate, he holding that the county would be the gainer by the contract system. The county court could not have made a better choice for the position than Mr. Kinnaird. He is a trained civil engineer and has had ten years experience in locating and establishing grades for railroad lines, a work similar to that demanded in carrying on the county road work. As to his honesty and integrity, there is no question, for those who are acquainted with him know that there will be no dishonest transactions in his management, nor will he allow designing contractors to take advantage of the county. The ENTERPRISE can vouch that the road funds of Clackamas county will be properly applied.

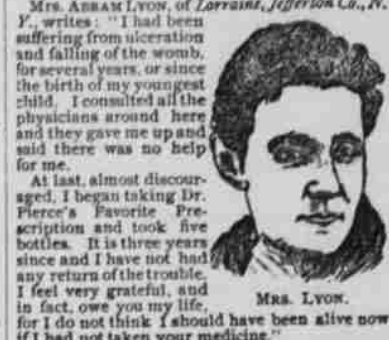
