## COUNTY COURT

**New Road District Denied—Suspension Bridge Case Settled—Bills allowed.**

Gordon E. Hayes, Judge; K. Scott and Frank Jaggar, Commissioners.

The February, 1895, term of the county court met last week and transacted the following business:

Report of viewers on the change in the Farnsworth road approved and change in said road established and expense account of \$32 allowed.

Report of viewers on the change in the D. C. Ball road approved and expense account of \$54.40 allowed. Claim for damages filed by Oliver Robbins and G. J. Trullinger. W. H. Mattoon, E. Harrington and Henry Jewell appointed viewers as to said damages if any.

Report of viewers on the change in the Hatton and Baker road approved and expense account of \$21.80 allowed.

Ordered that the sum of \$200 be allowed Kate Barclay for damages from the cable anchor for the suspension bridge to her property, Commissioner Jaggar dissenting.

Petition denied of E. B. Stark et al. for two road districts in Milk Creek precinct.

Petition of D. J. Parmeter et al. for a change in the Oregon City and Salem road granted and C. W. Armstrong, Adam Knight and D. W. Howard appointed viewers and D. W. Kinnaird surveyor; they to meet at place of beginning on Thursday, February 21, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Application of school district No. 48 for the transfer to said district of certain property in said district wrongly assessed to other districts.

Petition of J. F. Millstead et al. for assistance to Cyrus Burley referred to Commissioner Jaggar with power to act.

Petition of Henry Wilber et al. for a change in the Foster and Milwaukee road denied by reason the petition did not correspond with the notices posted up as to the number of signers and that the petition did not ask for the vacation of that part of the old road between the points of beginning and ending of the new road.

Petition of Geo. J. Currin et al. for a change in the Foster and Milwaukee road laid over until the next regular term and in the mean time the county engineer is to examine said road and report as to the practicability of said change.

In the application of W. A. White et al. to have the title of certain lots in the county addition to Oregon City perfected it was ordered that the county clerk execute on behalf of the county quit claim deeds to said lots freeing said lots from any claim that Clackamas county may have in the said lots.

Petition of S. D. Barney et al. for a change in the Tlayer road granted and T. B. Thomas, Henry Hughes and M. M. McGeehan appointed viewers and D. W. Kinnaird surveyor on said road; they to meet at place of beginning on Wednesday, February 27, at 10 A. M.

Petition of J. T. Drake et al. for rebuilding bridge across Butte Creek on Marquam and Mt. Angle road, laid over to confer with Marion county.

Bond of E. C. Maddock, sheriff, as tax collector examined and approved.

Proposition of H. H. Johnson et al. for the improvement of the Forsythe road declined.

Ordered that a warrant of \$8 per month commencing with February 1, 1895 be drawn for the relief of Joseph Raney, and that it be drawn in favor of A. M. Shibley.

Report of viewers on the change in the Oregon City and Molalla road approved and change ordered made and expense account of \$63.40 allowed.

Application of Chas. Miller et al. for a new road district in Viola precinct denied.

Ordered that the proposition of B. F. Linn to prepare road way, deliver and lay down and spike the lumber for planking the Highland road at \$7.50 per thousand be accepted and that the county judge be authorized to enter into contract on behalf of the county, said work to be done under the supervision of the road engineer.

Report of A. W. Cooke supervisor road district No. 1 approved and expense account for January allowed as follows: Labor \$90.75; supervision \$6.

Report of W. H. Smith, supervisor road district No. 2, approved and expense account for January allowed as follows: Labor \$132.95; material \$29.94; supervision \$21.

## An Eventful Day for Clackamas.

In response to letters missive sent out, at request of Rev. D. B. Gray, at present in charge of the work in Clackamas, to the Congregational churches of Oregon City, Portland and Willsburg, a council was held here today, composed of the following named delegates: Rev. C. F. Clapp, state organizer of Congregational churches for Oregon, Rev. R. A. Rowley, state superintendent Congregational Sunday schools, Rev. D. B. Gray, Congregational city missionary for Portland and vicinity, Rev. G. R. Wallace, D. D. of 1st Congregational church, Portland, P. W. Skinner, layman; Rev. J. J. Staub, Sunnyside Congregational church, Mrs. D. F. Hollabaugh, lay delegate; Rev. G. A. Rockwood, of Willsburg Congregational church, Rev. J. W. Cowan and Hon. C. H. Dye, 1st Congregational church, Oregon City.

The business of the council was to consider the matter of receiving into fellowship the 1st Congregational church of Clackamas, recently organized in this place. The first meeting was called at 10 a. m., Rev. C. F. Clapp as moderator. After the usual preliminary readings and examinations, the council adjourned to secret session. At 1 o'clock they were again called to order, Rev. Clapp making the announcement that the council had decided to receive the new church into the fellowship of Congregational churches. This announcement was followed by an address of welcome to the new church by the same gentleman; an address to the church by Dr. Cowan, addressed to the people by Dr. Wallace, and five-minute speeches by Rev. J. J. Staub, Rev. R. A. Rowley, Rev. D. B. Gray and Rev. G. A. Rockwood.

The ladies of the society served a dinner to the council at the residence of C. P. Ryckman. The organization intends erecting a church in the spring, and hopes to call the Rev. D. B. Gray to the pastorate. The church starts out with twenty-five members and has a very hopeful outlook, as several others are contemplating uniting with it at an early date.
