**A SUMMER HOUSE.**—White Brothers commenced Thursday the erection of a summer house for Mr. P. F. Morey on his ranch three miles below this city on the Willamette. The building will be a story and a half in height and colonial in architecture. It will be rustic in finish, the interior being in the natural wood, the frame work being planned and oiled and weather boarding planned on both sides. The main part of the building will be 24x60 feet with an addition on the back of 24x24 feet. On the lower floor of the main building will be the living room, a spacious apartment 24x48 feet to be used as a sitting, dining or hall room as may be needed. It will be fitted for comfort, an old fashioned fire place for four foot logs being a part of the fixtures. Adjoining this room will be a dressing room and the bath room. The ground floor of the addition will contain the kitchen, store room, pantry, etc. The upper floor of the main building will have twelve bedrooms while the upper floor of the addition will be fitted up for a play room for the children. A broad Piazza will extend along the entire front. Water will be supplied from a spring in the hills back of the park and both hot and cold water will be furnished. The building will be handsomely located on a knoll immediately in front of the park and will command a fine view of the Willamette river and the Cascade mountains and intervening country. It will be an ideal place to spend the hot days during summer.

**A NEW ELECTRIC LINE.**—Articles of incorporation have been filed with the secretary of state incorporating the Oregon City and Wilhoit Springs Railroad Co., with C. H. Caulfield, F. K. Arnold, H. H. Johnson, Sidney Smyth and L. L. Porter as incorporators. The object being to build an electric road from Oregon City to Wilhoit by way of Molalla. The route has not been definitely settled, but will be when the settlers decide, the amount of subsidy being a leading factor in its location. Of the ability of the company to carry out their undertaking there is no question. Mr. Caulfield being known as a man who never undertakes a thing without making a good of it and his position as secretary and one of the principal stockholders in the Portland General Electric Co., is an indication of the backing the company will have. Mr. Johnson, Smyth and Porter are equally as well known and their names give additional strength to the company. Mr. Arnold is one of the leading real estate men of Portland and a pusher who knows no fail. The work of securing the subsidy and locating the line will be commenced at once with the expectation of bringing about an early completion of the railroad.

**THE OREGON CITY IRON WORKS.**—J. Roake & Sons, of the Oregon City Iron Works, have taken advantage of the slackness in work of late to make some needed additions to their foundry and shop. Among the improvements made is that of putting in a small cupola for the melting of iron when sufficient orders are not in to justify firing up their large cupola. They have also added a brass casting cupola and are prepared to do all kinds of work in that line. Their foundry is now as complete as any in the State outside of Portland. In the intervals between jobs they have turned out a large number of hand-forged cold-chisels that in quality far exceed those sold in the stores, and which they offer for sale at reasonable prices. They have also manufactured a lot of brass reversible plumb-bobs that in finish and accuracy equal the best made in the East. These bobs are not usually carried in hardware stores, though mechanics who desire an instrument that is perfect, accurate and can be relied on, always use them.

**TAXES COMING IN.**—Sheriff Maddock reports taxes coming in much faster than expected. On last Friday the first day he had the roll open it looked like old times to see the number of taxpayers who were in to settle their taxes. The first contributor to the county's fund was W. O. Mack of Canby, who for himself and members of his paid family in \$198.63. The total amount taken in for the day was \$616 71 and the cash has been coming each day since fully as well. On the first day last year but \$14 70 was collected and for the first six days the total amount only reached \$649 34, being but little in excess of what was received the first day this year.

**ROAD WORK COMMENCED.**—Road Engineer Kinnaird is taking advantage of the good weather and is having road work started by his foremen in many of the districts. Foreman Swafford commenced with a force of men on the Molalla road last Monday. His work for the present will consist of clearing out the right of way to the full thirty feet of all timber and stumps preparatory to grading. For this season the work on this road will be confined principally to that part between Oregon City and Beaver creek as it will be impossible to improve the whole distance. The remainder of the road will be repaired enough to make it passable.

**LEFT FOR THE EAST.**—General O. O. Howard left last Monday for his home in New York. He goes by the southern route stopping at San Francisco, where he will deliver a lecture on March 8. On the 11th he will lecture in Oakland, and from there he will go to Los Angeles, and thence to Denver. From Denver he will go direct to his home. The General has many friends in Oregon City who regret his departure and wish him a pleasant trip. The addresses he delivered in this city were very interesting and were highly appreciated.

**MORE LEGAL BLANKS.**—To accommodate the increasing demand for legal blanks the ENTERPRISE office has nearly doubled its already large stock of blanks and now has the only complete line in the county. An additional case has been put in so that all the blanks may be alphabetically arranged for greater convenience in handling and now no office in Portland has better arranged blank cases than this office. The case was built by J. Jones & Son and is a credit to their skill as mechanics.

**FRUIT PROSPECT.**—Word comes from all over this county that the fruit prospects are most flattering. Notwithstanding the warm weather of late, the fruit buds are not so far advanced as would be expected, the cold nights having held them back. Though should this unusual warm weather continue much longer and then later on cold rains set in, there is danger that the crop may be cut short some, though a total failure is not apprehended as that has never occurred in Oregon.

**BOARD OF TRADE MEETING.**—The regular monthly meeting of the board of trade will be held on next Monday. President Charman will announce at this meeting the standing committees of the board for the ensuing year. Some important advertising matters will be up for consideration, and it is expected that a full attendance of the members will be had.
