

OUR NEW LAWS.

conveyances or county clerk, as the case may be, upon the presentation to him of any such notice of lien, to file the same in his office and to index the same in a book to be kept by him for that purpose and called "Index to Horse Shoe Liens," and he shall be entitled to a fee of 25 cents for so doing.

Any person may file successive liens upon the same animal, or different charges for shoeing the same, and he may include in any one claim of lien his charges for any number of times of shoeing such animal, but no lien shall be had for any shoeing of any such animal more than six months prior to the filing of the notice of lien.

Lien may be released by suitable entry of claimant on the Lien Index.

The liens may be foreclosed by suit or by advertisement and sale in the following manner: The person desiring to foreclose such a lien by advertisement and sale shall deliver to the sheriff or any constable of the county in which such animal is situated, a certified copy of the notice of lien with the request endorsed thereon for the foreclosure of such lien. Thereupon such sheriff or constable shall take such animal described in such notice into his possession and hold the same, and shall advertise the same for sale to satisfy said lien, once a week for two successive weeks in a daily or weekly newspaper published in said county, and after giving such notice shall sell such animal at public auction to the highest bidder for cash to satisfy said lien and accrued interest and the costs of taking possession and holding and selling the animal, delivering the overplus of money arising upon such sale, if any, to the owner of such animal or his authorized agent.

This act shall be liberally construed. In effect May 25th.

HOUSE BILL NO. 251.

To prohibit minors from visiting evil resorts:

It shall be unlawful for any minor to go into or visit under any pretext or for any purpose whatever, any house of prostitution, or any room or place inhabited or frequented by any prostitute, or used for purposes of prostitution. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to procure, request, order, or to in any wise induce any minor to go into or visit any such house, room or place, described in section 1 hereof, for any purpose whatever.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this act shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not less than \$100 and not more than \$250, or by imprisonment in the county jail for a period not exceeding one year, or both; and any corporation violating any of the provisions of this act shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not less than \$500 nor more than \$1,000.

Any minor violating any of the provisions of this act, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$100, or by incarceration for a period not exceeding six months in the state reform school.

HOUSE BILL NO. 321.

For employment of state convicts:

The governor is hereby authorized to contract with and lease to any person, firm or corporation upon such terms and for such compensation as he may deem advisable, not less however than thirty-five cents per day for the labor of each convict, the whole or any part of the labor of the convicts at any time confined in the penitentiary of this state, for any period or periods of time not exceeding ten years.

No convict shall be compelled to work while sick or otherwise incapacitated, and no convict shall be compelled to labor for a longer time than ten hours each day. The superintendent, warden and other proper officer or officers of the penitentiary shall have general charge and custody of the convicts while they are engaged in such labor. The compensation received for the labor of the convicts shall be paid to the treasurer of the state of Oregon quarterly and become a part of the general fund of the state. The labor of convicts shall be performed by them within the penitentiary or within the yard or enclosure thereof.

All contracts made for the labor of convicts shall be in writing and a copy thereof shall be filed in the office of the secretary of state. Every person with whom any contract is made for the labor of convicts before he shall be entitled to the same shall execute and deliver a bond to the state of Oregon in such sum as the governor may require with one or more sureties to be approved by the governor, conditioned that such contractor will pay over all sums of money which may become due on his contract. When any convict, by reason of sickness or inability, shall be unable to perform labor, the contractor shall not be required to pay for the labor of such convict during the time he is unable to work.

In effect immediately.

THE SCHOOL LANDS.

The Daily bill has been approved, and stops all sale of indemnity school lands for two years. The bill does not affect the sale of about a million acres of other school lands. Whatever sections 16 or 36 are not found in a fractional township, or in reservations, or have been home-

steaded, or for any loss of some two sections, there will be selected lieu lands by a commissioner, to be appointed by the governor. These lands so selected will be withheld from sale for two years, until they can be listed, located and price fixed at not less than \$2.50 per acre.

The office of commissioner will be one much sought after, and it will be a hard one to fill. One man can never do the work. It is doubtful if a dozen men could. The best timber and farm lands only must be selected. It will be a task for the next legislature to fix the price of these lands.

SENATE BILLS.

No. 45—Creating 9th judicial district, composed of Grant, Malheur and Harney counties, governor to appoint prosecuting attorney, Morton D. Clifford, elected one of the judges of the sixth district, to be judge. Approved February 20th.

No. 41—To appropriate \$40,000 for expenses of legislature.

No. 135—To authorize certain corporations to appropriate lands for railroads, skidroads, tramways and flumes, for operating mines, quarries, timber lands, etc. Approved February 18th.

No. 162—Creating 6th judicial district out of Umatilla and Morrow counties, Judge Fee to be judge, and governor to appoint a prosecuting attorney.

No. 168—To protect native song birds, making it unlawful to kill, take, injure, destroy or have in possession, sell or offer for sale, any such bird. The bill names every song bird that inhabits Oregon at any season of the year and fixes penalties. Approved February 23d.

No. 31—Amends sec. 159, code civil procedure relating to attachments.

No. 237—Provides for relocation of Coos county seat.

No. 231—Protect fish and game, and provides for appointment of fish and game warden. Makes closed seasons as follows: Mountain sheep between Dec. 1st and August 1st; grouse, pheasants, Mongolian pheasant, quail, partridge, from December 1st to September 1st, except for breeding purposes; prairie chickens from October 1st to July 1st. No game birds to be killed in greater numbers than 20; prohibits robbing nests of any game bird, and prohibits sale in open market. Prohibits killing at any time of any spotted fawn, or killing deer at night, or with hounds; fine \$25 to \$200. Prohibits killing all large game for hides at any time. Approved Feb. 23d; not in effect for three months.

No. 229—Defines boundary to Multnomah county.

No. 84—Fixing time for exemptors and administrators to report.

No. 195—Amends soldiers' home act of 1893, approved Feb. 25th, in effect.

No. 191—Fixing pay of county clerks, recorders and sheriffs.

No. 226—Amends ballot law, repeals Australian ballot as at present, but substitutes a similar ballot, providing that, instead of erasing candidates not desired, simply making a mark before the name of the candidate wanted.

No. 7—Prevents title to streets and other public property being lost by adverse occupancy.

No. 186—Provides for new sewer from asylum and penitentiary to river to cost \$15,000.

No. 201—To regulate practice of medicine and surgery, creates board of five who have been physicians for seven years, three regulars, one electric and one homeopath.

No. 229—Provides for organization and government of irrigation districts.

No. 28—Defines a felony.

No. 24—Extends time for judgment debtors to redeem to one year.

The bill to amend the attachment law makes no important change but only makes the law clearer. Approved February 23rd. No emergency clause.

No. 15—Exempts all land within the bounds of a county road free from taxation. Approved February 25th.

No. 23—Provides for recording assignments, transfers and satisfaction of mortgages to be recorded at full length. In effect February 23rd.

No. 156—Provides for building branch insane asylum at Union, Or., and appropriates \$140,000. Approved and in effect since February 6th. Superintendent to have \$6 a day.

No. 113—Makes all streets and alleys in unincorporated towns public highways.

No. 244—Authorizes county court of Lane county to operate a free ferry.

No. 61—Amends road law to allow county court to construct punchon or plank roads.

No. 1—Repeals jute mill act.

No. 33—Amends attachment law.

No. 8—Authorizes mayors of unincorporated towns to bid in property sold for taxes.

No. 74—Raises age of consent to sixteen years.

No. —Amends contagious disease of animals act.

No. 112—Requires superintendent of asylum to report to county, death or discharge of patients.

HOUSE BILLS.

No. 41—Authorizes school district of 25,000 population and over to borrow money. Approved January 29th.

No. 65—To authorize governor to appoint timber land commissioner to select lieu school lands. Approved February 19th.

No. 382—General appropriation bill. Approved, February 23rd.

No. 92—Fixing salaries of county

treasurers. This bill raises the salary of the county treasurer from \$800 to \$1000, and applies only to Douglas county.

No. 321—Authorizes governor to lease to any firm or person convict labor not to exceed 10 years, at not less than 35 cents a day. Approved February 23rd and in effect.

No. 228—Creates office of county auditor of Multnomah county.

No. 229—Fixes compensation of justices and constables in cities of 50,000.

No. 79—To regulate the incorporation and business of building and loan and savings and loan associations doing a general business, does not apply to associations which confine loans to county where organized or counties immediately adjacent thereto. In effect May 25th.

No. 342—Fixing time of holding court in First district.

No. 42—Forming dyke districts on lands subject to tidal and freshet overflow, same as drainage law.

No. 27—To protect fish in Willowa lake.

No. 5—Requires every foreign fire, fire and marine, life, life and accident, plate glass and boiler insurance company doing business in this state to take out a license, report its business annually by statement of its gross premiums, and pay two per cent tax on such gross premiums less losses paid within the state and premiums returned, such tax to be in lieu of all taxes on personal property. In effect May 25th.

To authorize city of Astoria to condemn, purchase or acquire a bridge across Young's bay, and issue \$100,000 bonds therefor.

To add county of Lincoln to the second judicial district.

CHARTER BILLS.

To incorporate Gold Hill, Jackson county.

To legalize bonded indebtedness of City of Astoria.

To amend charter Independence. Also bills to amend charters of Oakland, Canyon City, Portland, Dalles City, Harrisburg, Hubbard, Woodburn, Corvallis, East Cottage Grove, Oregon City, Athena, Brownsville, Baker City, Hillsboro Dundee, Albany, Cornelius, Fossil, Ashland, Dallas, Burns, Florence, McMinnville, Sheridan, Mt. Angel, and Prairie City.
