Republican League Convention.

Great preparations are being made all over the state to attend the convention of the republican clubs at Portland, May 22nd, to better organize the republican league of Oregon and to elect delegates from this state to the national league convention at Cleveland June 19. Already Capt. At Portland this certificate should be countersigned by Secretary Wells, when it entitles the holder to purchase a return ticket at one-third the regular fare. At this rate there should be a large attendance of delegates and of other republicans interested in the welfare of the party. Every club in this county should be fully represented. Secretary Wells is preparing a Republican League Regising part in its councils.
