HOG FAMILIES.

Typical Poland-China, Berkshire, Duroc-Jersey and Essex Boars.

We present this week the best types of four of the most popular hog families to the United States. The hog which is found spread over the wildest section of country and believed by the most breeders to be the one perfect animal for pork is the Poland-China, shown in Fig. 1.

The Poland-China was developed in Ohio from several other breeds. It is sometimes called the Magie hog. There

is a strong infusion of Berkshire blood in the mix, which has proved so profitable. The Poland-China hog will thrive anywhere. It is black or black and white in color, with small ears and a short nose. Its ability to lay on fat and make a large carcass quickly is what commends it especially to hog raiserand to packers. Good specimens can be made to weigh 500 pounds at 18 to 20 months old.

The Berkshire of good old English descent is very popular in the eastern states. William Crozier, writing in "How the Farm Pays," says he prefers it to all others. It is a black hog, with white feet, a white splash on the face

is its most marked feature. The Berkshire makes a large proportion of lean meat, which suits the taste of the present day exactly. This breed has very con. 
