BUILDING IMPROVEMENTS.


New Structures are Going up in Every Direction.

Below is given a brief list of the buildings now under course of construction in Oregon City. It is expected that many more will be put up during the summer so that while there is no building boom on, yet a substantial growth will be had that will keep this place to the front as the solid town of Oregon.
W. A. White is completing a new residence for L. C. Caples on 9th and Madison streets. H. P. Bestow furnished the mill work for the dwelling. This building will cost about \$600.
W. A. White is constructing a new dwelling for Sidney Smyth on Eighth street near the head of Seventh street. The structure will cost about \$850.
Adolph Milchutine has an elegant modern cottage completed at Willamette Falls. It will cost \$1000, and J. Jones was the builder.
J. Jones, the builder, has a residence for himself partially completed at Willamette Falls to cost \$1000.
George Wood's new cottage on 14th and John Quincy Adams street, is nearing completion, and will cost \$600.
B. F. Swope moved into his new dwelling in the northwest part of the city this week. It cost \$900.
Frank Fosburg, has completed an elegant two-story residence in Bolton at a cost of \$1000.
O. Fosburg has commenced a dwelling in Bolton. The Mechanic's mill are doing the mill work for the structure. It will cost \$700.
G. W. Grace is completing a two-story building at Ely 22x30 feet. The lower floor will be occupied by Mr. Grace as a general merchandise store, and the upper floor will be used as a dwelling.
James Roake's house on 11th and Jefferson's streets, is being entirely remodeled and reconstructed. He has had J. D. Renner move the one-story house to the back part of the lot, and in front a two-story building, 16x20 and modern in style will be erected. The old part of the building will be raised another story and a new roof put on. J. Jones is the builder, and the cost of the additions and changes will amount to about \$500.
The Barclay residence has been remodeled and repaired, as it stands back of the Barclay brick and is handsome a dwelling as any on the river front.
John Schram is having a two-story frame building erected on Main street, that will cost about \$1000.
Dr. J. W. Powell has completed an elegant five-room cottage on Fourth street that is very tasty in design. The cost is about \$700.
Peter Paquet will have a two-story addition built on the south side of his house. The lower story will be used for a library and sitting room and the upper for a bed chamber.
Henry Weinhard's brick to be constructed on the northwest corner of Main and Eight streets, will be 56x100 feet, and three stories high. The lower floor will be occupied by store rooms, and the upper stories will be fitted up for office rooms.
The bids for the construction of Daniel William's two-story store building, to be erected on Seventh street were opened in C. H. Dye's office Friday. The bidders were Vonderabre & Bros., \$849.50; Scott & Frost, \$690; Taylor & Took, \$818; Jones & Renner, \$900; Horn & Wishart, \$723. Messrs. Scott & Frost were awarded the contract for \$696. The building will be 60x44.
Mrs. Charles Bolds, Charles S. Ohlson, R. S. Bellomy, Fred Fuller and Rev. C. A. Woody of Portland, have completed and are furnishing up dwellings at Gladstone to cost \$1000 each.
Col. R. A. Miller has let a contract to Horn & Wishart to build an elegant modern residence at Gladstone to cost when completed \$1,400.
John A. Graham is completing a dwelling at Gladstone to cost \$400, C. A. Beade a residence to cost \$250, and H. E. Cross has a \$600 dwelling under way.
The Sisters of the Good Shepherd will soon erect a Home of Refuge near the south bank of the Clackamas and lying between the Southern Pacific track and the East Side railway. The building will be 30x75 feet and three stories high, besides the basement. Stone for the foundation is now being laid on the ground, and the structure will be steadily pushed toward completion. It is estimated the building will cost about \$15,000. The location is a splendid one, lying in close proximity to Gladstone and Park Place and almost surrounded by a thrifty orchard. T. W. Sullivan is engineering the plans and construction of the foundation, which is a guarantee that the building will have a good beginning.
The Bank of Oregon City is having the front rooms upstairs remodeled, and they will be models of convenience and neatness when completed.
H. L. Kelly is having three neat cottages erected on Washington street between Seventh and Eighth. Their cost will be about \$400 each. One of the buildings is about finished and work has been commenced on the second.
Charles Hill is making preparations to erect a neat cottage in Sunset addition.

Monday the river steamer Altona, running on the Salem route, was seized by Collector of Customs Black, says the Oregonian, for violation of the navigation laws. Chief Inspector Black took possession of the vessel and placed Inspectors Chambers and Gallagher in charge until the owners furnished \$1000 bonds, when it was released. The seizure was made on information that coal oil was being carried on the boat in violation of section 4472, revised statutes. The Altona is the third river steamer seized by Collector Black within a week for violation of navigation laws, the Dallas City and the Regulator being the other two boats. The Altona only lost about an hour's time, and made her trip on time.
About fifty Oregon City people went to Portland Tuesday evening to attend the reception and lecture of Dr. Francis E. Clark, founder and president of the United Christian Endeavor convention. The lecture was delivered in the First Presbyterian church and only about one-half the seating capacity was filled. Had this interesting lecture been delivered in Oregon City, a building could hardly have held all the people who attended. An invitation was extended the United Society of Endeavor to hold its next convention in Portland.
The people of Oregon City will have an opportunity to laugh and learn at the Methodist church next week. Captain Eli, the modern "Sinbad the Sailor," will give three great nautical lectures beginning with Monday evening as follows: Monday evening, "Jonah and the Whale," from the whaleman's standpoint. Tuesday evening, "Capturing the Leviathan." Wednesday evening, "The Monsters of the Deep." Under the auspices of the Methodist church. Admission, 15 cents; children, 5 cents; season tickets, 25 cents.
A free social will be given at the Beaver Creek Welsh Congregational church at 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon, May 30th. The ladies of the church will provide entertainment for all who will participate in the meeting. All are invited to attend this meeting as well as the entertainment which begins at 7 p. m. The program will be supported by some outside talent. Miss A. Jones of Oswego, H. O. Inskip of Hazeldele, William H. Jones of Leland district, and others will be there.
The entertainment given in Batdorf's hall at Willamette Falls last week under the auspices of the Sunday School was a very successful affair. The electric car had to make two trips to carry all the passengers from Oregon City. Among those who participated in the exercises from this city were Mrs. Sada White and C. A. Miller on the musical part of the program, and a 10-year-old daughter of G. W. Woods, who gave a splendid club swinging exercise.
At the regular meeting of the McLaughlin Chautauqua circle last Monday night, Mrs. C. H. Dye spent some little time explaining how they succeeded in securing such prominent talent for the assembly to be held at Gladstone Park, July 10-20. A. S. Dresser, who has charge of the musical department of the assembly, has decided to make it a musical convention, and musicians from every part of the state are invited to attend and participate.
In the matter of the new school district to be formed out of Lynn and Hendrick districts, there are but 18 children of school age instead of 27, the number recently mentioned in the ENTERPRISE. It is expected, however, that when the district is formed families who own property in the district, will move in, and the number of pupils will be increased to 34.
